McGRAW TO QUIT?—INDICATIONS SAY SO

Is John J. "Muggsy" McGraw losing his grip? The repeated stories that this will be his last season as manager of the Giants, his inability to control "Bugs" Raymond, and the fact that the New York team has been disappointing, is believed by many close followers of the game to indicate the scrappy leader is to quite the game.

Twice has McGraw found it necessary to thrash Raymond. The first fight occurred in a sleeping-car, and the second in a Pittsburgh hotel where Raymond jumped his boss while the latter was snoozing, only to receive a beautiful thumping.

McGraw's career in baseball has been stormy. He broke into the game at Bay City, Mich., from which place he was snatched in 1892 by Manager Bill Barnie, for Baltimore, to act as an ornament on the Orioles' bench.

In 1893 Ned Hanlon became manager of Baltimore, and soon discovered that McGraw knew more about the game than most men. Hanlon developed the "Big Four"—McGraw, Jennings, Kelley and Keeler.

In 1899 McGraw was made manager of the "Leftovers," as the Orioles were derisively called, but they finished in fourth place. His joining the American League when the National became an eight-club organization, his scraps with Ban Johnson, and his appointment as manager of the New York National League club are matters of recent history.
