SHOOT HIS LANDLORD IN ROW OVER RENT

A Montreal French-Canadian Attacks Man Whom He Alleges Abused His Mother.

Montreal, Feb. 7.—Alphonse Martel, a French-Canadian, probably fatally shot his landlord, James McGovern, on Saturday, shot one of his daughters in the wrist, and felled another with a bottle as the result of a row over rent. An argument occurred between McGovern and Mrs. Martel (Martel's mother), in the midst of which the young man whipped out a revolver and started firing indiscriminately. The first bullet hit McGovern under the eye, entering the brain. Martel then fired the older McGovern girl as she ran, hitting her in the wrist. The younger girl also ran away and Martel chased her with a tin Lottie, hitting her over the head. Martel and his mother were arrested, and the young man said he did the shooting because he could not stand the way McGovern was abusing his mother. It is not expected that McGovern will live.

FOOD-PRICE FIGHT AN ENDURANCE TEST

New York and New Jersey Continue to Look Into the Combines.

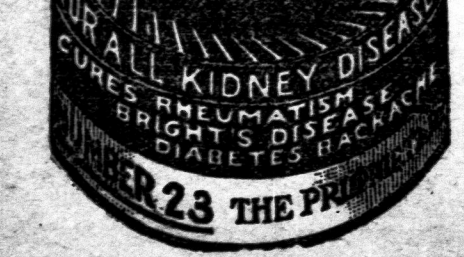
New York, Feb. 7.—With extreme cold weather tending to drive quotations up, and the first wave of enthusiasm in the crusade against the combine, the campaign in metropolitan territory settled down today to something like an endurance test. The week opened, however, with prospects of trouble for the combines alleged to be illegally keeping up rates for necessities of life through misuse of cold storage and other means. New York and New Jersey renewed activities in the campaign. Attorney-General O'Malley, of New York State, is credited with the intention to invoke an old injunction against the packing companies, granted in the supreme court in 1902, and forbidding them from fixing meat prices and preventing competition by agreement as to rates and supply. This is said to be still in force. Relatively unimportant introduced in the New York board of aldermen, and aimed particularly at altered cold storage evils, are to be pressed for passage. In New Jersey the Hudson County grand jury continued its inquiry into the business of the great storage warehouses of Jersey City.

hardly to take unnecessary risks with it. The origin of the fire is a mystery. Mr. George Forsythe stated that there was a stove at the rear of the ground floor, and that the blaze may have started from that point. The elevator shaft is situated near there, and would account for the flames rushing to the top of the building, as was the case. The rear door of the first floor was open when the brigade arrived. Fire Chief Aitken was the first there.

FIRE CHIEF'S STATEMENT.

"I ran over from the hall," said the chief. "When I got there the whole floor of the building was in flames. They were pouring out of the three upper stories in great shape. The back door of the warehouse was open a foot, furnishing plenty of draught for the fire."

"As soon as I saw it, I knew the place was doomed, and our care was to prevent it spreading to Reason's and McMahon's. I went to the fire, and I think the boys did good work there."

STARTED FROM A STOVE?

Mr. George Forsythe was in the warehouse at 5 o'clock, and found everything all right. He is of the opinion that the flames started from the stove in the rear of the first floor. Mr. Adam T. McMahon got a scare. He was attending a meeting of the water commissioners, when a man rushed in and told him that his warehouse was burning down. In the language of the street, Mr. McMahon "beat it" to the fire. He remained there until it was evident that the fire was completely under control, and would not endanger his premises.

He is busily engaged this morning in discovering what loss he suffered. The smoke poured through his building in large quantities. It will be some time before an approximation of the loss can be made.

LARGE CROWDS. Large crowds witnessed the fire. It was not pleasant by any means. The cold was intense, and the water was blown back into the spectators' faces in cutting snow. The firemen looked like snowmen. Water ran down the street in miniature rivers, and caused not a little inconvenience.

IMPOSING DELEGATION TO INTERVIEW THE PREMIER

Names of Those Who Will Jointly Ask for a Grant for the Western University.

The delegation to interview Sir James Whitney, with a view to securing a grant for the Western University, will be a large one. At a meeting of the board of governors on Saturday, Capt. T. J. Murphy outlined the plans for the trip on Feb. 16, and from reports received the delegation will be a most imposing one. The delegation from the board of governors will comprise the whole board, as follows: Mr. Justice R. M. Meredith, T. H. Purdom, K. C., T. H. Smallman, J. H. Chapman, Capt. T. J. Murphy, C. R. Somerville, Col. J. W. Little, Dr. John D. Wilson, George C. Gibbons, J. O. Dromgoole and Principal James. The city council will send Mayor Beattie, Ald. Eckert, Ald. Stevenson, and Ald. Jeffery. The county of Elgin will send Dr. Ling, of Dutton, Reeve W. Jackson, ex-M. P., of Port Stanley, and Judge J. C. Thompson. It is expected that Mayor George of St. Thomas, will also be a delegate. The Middlesex county council will appoint Warden Campbell, County Councillors James A. McGregor and St. Frank Glass. It is expected that Lambton County will name Warden Auld and Reeve D. McEwen. The board of education have decided on Chairman W. W. Gammage, and the senate, Inspector Edwards, Dr. Moorhouse, Dr. Eccles, and perhaps one or two others. The separate school board will also have a representative, and the Trades and Labor Council will probably endorse Mr. H. B. Archer as a representative from that body. The board of trade have endorsed Mr. A. T. McMahon, Dr. H. T. Reason, U. A. Buchner and Mr. Arthur W. White as their representatives. Rev. Father Tobin may be the representative from the Sacred Heart Academy.

Other Probable Delegates.

Among others who are being corresponded with are: Judge Holt, of Goderich; Matthew Wilson, K. C., of Chatham; Mr. McHugh, of Chatham; Chas. Jenkins, Petrolia; Dr. Fairbank, Petrolia; Judge Barron, of Stratford, and many other leading citizens in the district.

"We hope to have a fine delegation when we go to Toronto on Feb. 16," said Capt. T. J. Murphy. "We have had a large number of acceptances already, and are writing for more. It should impress the Government."

A number of private citizens will also go. Many are taking a deep interest in the Western, and they feel that they would like to impress the Government with the necessity of doing something for this institution. MINISTER APPEALS TO YOUNG PEOPLE

Rev. Mr. Inkster Says the Evils of Gambling and Drinking Should be Banished.

GAMBLING AND RACING

Prominent Public Men's Statements in This Regard Are Alluded to in Strong Language.

Rev. J. Gibson Inkster, at the First Presbyterian Church: "There are prominent public men today who by their stand are actually saying: 'Gambling is necessary to horse-racing; Sabbath desecration is necessary to success in business, and drinking is necessary for revenue.' If these statements are true, we are in a very bad way. We read the signs of the times and easily see how disastrous the issue will be to the youth of our Dominion. I tremble for our destiny when I hear and see such statements made, and I ask you young men and women to rise and declare that they are not true, and drive out these evils by a life of loyalty to God and service to Jesus Christ."

Rev. Dr. Manning, at Dundas Centre Methodist Church: "Jesus Christ was complained against greatly over matters in which there was no wrong whatever. They said he broke the Sabbath, was the friend of sinners, while He was at the same time doing the best things. There are tendencies in our nature to certain errors, and we must guard against them. One of them is finding fault with people better than ourselves. The end of religion is to make men better, if it does not only fanatical. If a man is not good, he will be good."

Rev. A. J. Vining at Tabbot Street Baptist Church: "A troubled conscience takes all the comfort out of us and makes other people seem as nothing." Misfortune often shows up a supposed friend in his true light, as in the case of Shimei and David. There was a time when Shimei would have grovelled in the dust to obtain the king's favor, but in David's misfortune he abused him.

The Lenten Pastoral issued recently by Bishop Williams was read in a large number of the Anglican churches throughout the diocese yesterday. During the reading the choir sang a number of addresses appropriate to the season.

Mr. Donald M. Barton at the Auditorium: "The Bible may not be the best text book on physiology or science, but it is the best work on life. If you train your body and forget your soul you will destroy your life. It is not more physical or intellectual training that we need, but more spiritual."

Rev. Richard Whiting, at the First Methodist Church: "If a man sins against God, the consequences will inevitably turn against him himself."

Rev. Walter Moffatt, at Chalmers Church: "Christ glorified his father by uniting the true Christian life, by a recognition of his work in the field, and by the completion of that work. We should all aim to do the same. We can glorify him in our every-day life if we live as Christians should."

Mrs. Belmont came quickly to her feet and said: "The Negro woman, that unless this cause means freedom and equal rights to all women, of every race, of every creed, rich or poor, it decreases its effect and worthiness, and it must fail."

MAD DOG SCARE

And have since gone mad, and had to be killed. The children are at present in the Pasteur Institute in New York. In Tibury East a boy who was skating on a pond last week was snapped at by a dog, which bit his hand. The dog bit eight other dogs in the district.

Off to Pasteur Institute.

A public meeting was held, and money was given by the township council to send the boy to New York, where he is being treated. Parties have been out hunting all over the district trying to locate the dogs that were bitten, and the greatest excitement prevails. For the eight have been killed, but the others have disappeared, and it is not known how many other dogs have been bitten. The situation is, according to those who are investigating, of a most alarming nature, and the Government order has come none too soon.

Must Muzzle the Dogs.

At Mitchell recently the town council, after a mad dog scare, held a meeting, and ordered every dog in the district to be either muzzled or tied up, and gave the constables full authority to shoot all dogs found running loose which were unmuzzled.

An added danger is the fact that many of the dogs that have been bitten and are running loose have probably bitten cattle, and farmers are warned to keep the closest watch upon their animals and notify the inspectors at once if they notice any animals acting peculiarly.

Ottawa, Feb. 6.—With probably between two and three hundred mad dogs roaming around all parts of Western Ontario, and new cases of rabies being reported to the veterinary director-general's department almost daily, the Minister of Agriculture and Dr. Rutherford, acting in co-operation with the health department of the Ontario Government, has determined on drastic action to stamp out the deadly disease. It has been steadily growing more prevalent ever since it was first introduced into the province by a dog which crossed the Suspension bridge over the Niagara River at Queenston in May, 1907, and bit several Canadian dogs.

Under authority of an order in respect to rabies, an order was issued Saturday by the department of agriculture on the report of Dr. Rutherford, veterinary director-general, to the effect that rabies is known to exist in a number of separate parts of the western peninsula of Ontario, directing that all dogs in that part of the province living west of the eastern boundaries of York and Simcoe counties, must be securely chained in an out-house or other building, or kept under lock and key, or else kept constantly muzzled with effective metallic muzzles in a manner satisfactory to the veterinary inspectors of the department. The order further states that in any municipality where rabies is known actually to exist, the muzzling privilege may be withdrawn. These cases all dogs must be detained or isolated by being chained or kept under lock and key.

Forty-Two Bitten.

This order, affecting as it does every dog in the province, is being issued from a little east of Toronto, and requiring the muzzling or chaining of many thousands of dogs is being dealt with as a matter of public health. The order is being issued as a result of the spread of the disease in the above district. For infringement of the regulation a fine of \$200 may be imposed under the federal act, and under the provincial health act a fine of \$100 may be imposed. The provincial secretary has been directed to issue a regulation to the effect that all dogs in the province must be muzzled or chained, and will use the machinery of the provincial constables and veterinary inspectors in enforcing the order. The dual jurisdiction in the case is because the act in question deals with the spread of the disease in the province, while the provincial health act deals with the spread of the disease in the city. How It Spread.

A history of the spread of rabies from Queenston after the visit of a dog which did the mischief, nearly three years ago, shows the rapid way in which the disease has extended from one county to another. A peculiarity of the disease is that as soon as rabies develops the dog starts out to roam the country, biting and infecting other dogs or cattle, and frequently carrying the disease 30 or 40 miles away before it dies. From Queenston the disease spread to Welland, Lincoln, Haldimand and Brant counties by June, 1908. In the following months outbreaks were reported in Norfolk and Oxford counties. Last year cases were reported from Waterloo, Westworth and Perth counties, and by July infected dogs had gone as far west as Clinton, in Huron county. During the past two weeks cases have been reported from Simcoe and York counties, and from nearly every county in the whole of the western peninsula. New cases, often from widely separated districts, are now being reported with alarming frequency. In Galt and Paris over 60 dogs have been killed, and a few days ago a case of rabies was reported from Toronto.

Dr. Rutherford states that there must now be scores of mad dogs scattered throughout the infected districts, and every dog running loose is exposed to the disease. To stamp out the only remedy is the one adopted, and though the remedy is a severe one, the authorities believe it is amply justified by the present conditions and by the danger to which the public is subjected. How long the order will have to be in force depends to some extent on the manner in which it can be enforced, and upon the co-operation of dog owners and municipal authorities generally.

The Toronto Humane Society have issued a statement in reference to the many reported cases of "rabies," as follows: "As the Toronto Humane Society has been appealed to by many people in reference to the many reported cases of 'rabies,' it is thought advisable to make the following statement: 'That there is an outbreak of this disease in different portions of the country is apparent, whether it is of a violent type or not does not prove that it is not rabies. A number of people have been bitten, but we believe that no person so bitten has developed the rabid symptoms. Many, if not all, of these people are under treatment. We have every confidence that the departments of both the Provincial and Dominion Governments are

and will do all in their power to stamp out the disease, and we call upon all people everywhere to refrain from making any exaggerated statements concerning the cases reported, and to keep from getting scared. It cannot be helped, perhaps, that some dogs may be destroyed, while being suspected, that have not the disease. Under the circumstances, whether in the city or in any other portion of the Dominion, the disease must be stamped out, and we must exercise confidence in the authorities that the very best will be done for the general good."

FORECAST OF BRITISH POLITICS

O'Connor Says Asquith Must Continue Attack on the House of Lords.

SCORES THE O'BRIENITES

Keir Hardie Thinks Budget Will Win, But That Veto Power of Peers Is Safe.

London, Feb. 7.—T. P. O'Connor, M. P., whose organization of the Irish vote in the English, Welsh and Scotch elections practically won the Liberal majority, when asked for views on the proposals of the present enormously interesting political situation, said:

"There is fortunately but one policy possible for the Government when Parliament meets. The line of safety and prudence is also the line of courage and straightforwardness. Any Liberal minister who now makes the mistake of dallying or wavering with the question of the Lords would be doomed to immediate extinction. All the talk in Unionist newspapers about compromises, conferences and national agreements is so much nonsense. One point is eagerly debated, whether Asquith has or has not obtained already a majority in the House of Commons. It is necessary to do away with the present veto of the peers. My impression is there is fairly clear understanding between the King and the Premier, and if the King really desires a guarantee to create enough new peers to swamp the present Unionist majority in the House of Lords, the Government must proceed."

"Then the one thing that the Liberal party would be to halt now in its campaign against the Lords. Much nonsense is being talked about the composite character of the anti-peers majority. I take a cheerful view of the prospects. I see no sign of wavering in Asquith. He is not a man who wavers. He has something of the bluntness, brevity and business, if you please, of the typical Yorkshire man. On the other hand, he has Yorkshire doggedness and a high sense of the sacredness of the given word. He has Yorkshire thoroughness in doing what he has set out to do. If he wavers everybody knows he would lose George and Churchill, and no Liberal cabinet could exist a day without these two powerful popular figures, but there is no necessity for any such heroic partings."

"Finally, as to the small parliamentarian group brought into being by Ireland, William O'Brien's return to public life, it will doubtless be a Liberal in spirit and mischievous in purpose, but it will be irritating rather than formidable. It will give trouble, but has not in it the elements of durability or effectiveness even for mischief."
