How To Do It

At breakfast, porridge may be served or not, according to the needs of the family. For children a small helping is good. The puddings are made by soaking in cold water a cupful of broken pieces of toast and bread freed from very brown crusts. Squeeze out dry, add 2 beaten eggs, 1 teaspoonful of salt, 2 heaping cupfuls of flour, 2 teaspoonfuls of cream of tartar, and enough water to make a stiff batter. Last of all before frying, add 1 teaspoonful of soda, dissolved in 1 tablespoonful of water. Fry plenty of smoking hot fat in the pan and drop in a tablespoonful of each pancake. Send to the table piping hot. They need no butter. The more eggs the better; one will serve, but 2 or 3 are better. The soup for lunch is very nourishing, and with dessert is sufficient for anyone.
