LABOR TO BE ISSUE IN McNAMARA TRIAL

Talesmen Will Be Question, If Court Permits, On Attitude to Unionism.

[Canadian Press.]
Los Angeles, Oct. 13.—Examination of talesman, F. T. Nelson, was the first proceeding set before Judge Walter B. Dwyer, of the supreme court today in the murder trial of James B. McNamara. Questioning of talesmen frequently resumed as a dismal proceeding, furnished in this case interesting, because it was expected to define, in the opening of the defense, some of the essential issues of the trial, which is designed to show whether the defendant is responsible for the death of Charles D. Haggerty, who, with twenty others, was killed in the Los Angeles Times' explosion over a year ago. For nineteen deaths James B. McNamara is held on indictments, but the state has elected to go to trial on Haggerty's case.

Attitude of Labor.
Nelson's attitude towards labor organizations and their members, touched upon at the preceding session of court, was made the subject of further inquiry for the defense, under Attorney Clarence S. Darrow, and the rulings of the court, on objections interposed by District Attorney John B. Frederick and his aides, were awaited as showing what confines would be placed upon the examination of other talesmen.

Before Nelson's examination was taken up one more talesman was called into the box to replace one dismissed at the last moment of court on Wednesday. He was a man of physical inability to stand a long trial.

To Proceed Rapidly.
Because of the determination of questions involved in the examination of Nelson, the first talesman, it was said that questioning of other talesmen would go forward much more rapidly.

The talesmen transferred last night from the official jury room to more commodious quarters, romped like boys at their morning bath, and appeared immensely refreshed by the day of ease offered by yesterday's legal holiday.

Dr. Hutchinson and Dr. Williams corroborated this statement, and declared that so far as they could see, there was no cause for alarm.

Superintendent Glauzitz said that he had had a conversation over the telephone with Dr. Amyot, of Toronto, who stated that there was no reason to be alarmed at the water supply. There were color bacilli present, but in such small quantities as to be practically negligible. Samples of water were being taken from the sources of supply both to the Colville and pump-house ponds in order to discover if possible the source of infection.

There is no danger, and the people should be told so, said Mr. Glauzitz. "There were no typhoid fever germs in the water, and I want that understood."

Mr. John Graham asked if a cement wall about the ponds now closed would not protect them from any surface drainage. Mr. Glauzitz thought that the suggestion would be proper, but he did not consider it necessary to go to the expense of building a cement wall. A clay bank would serve the purpose.

Pure Water.
Mr. R. A. Carrothers declared that the city water was practically pure, and had always been pure. The majority of the cases of typhoid in the city came from outside places. Many of them were infected while at summer resorts, and when they came to the city with the disease, the city water is blamed.

In response to a question from Chairman Clarke, Dr. Hutchinson reported that he examined four to five samples of milk a month.

"The board has done well to go thoroughly into this matter," said Dr. Williams. "It will reassure the citizens. In the meantime the board should continue its investigations, as the water supply of the city should be kept above reproach."

Chairman Clarke deplored the fact that he was being overlooked in the matter.

Everybody seems to know about these reports except the chairman," he stated. "They were in the newspapers before I saw them. I do not think that they should be given out until such a time as the board considers it advisable to do so. I never hear anything from Dr. Hutchinson. He seems to desire to keep information from me. I know nothing about what is going on in the department."

"You hear everything, and you know it," declared Dr. Hutchinson. "Every report was handed to you, with the exception of the water report. You are out of the city so much that it is difficult to know you are home. Every bit of information in my possession is always given to you."

A Heavier Man.
"If you want a heavier man for chairman, get him," continued Mr. Clarke. "If the board is not satisfied, get somebody else."

The little speech being over, the board authorized the payment of certain accounts.

Those present were: Harry Clarke (chairman), John Graham, R. A. Carrothers, Dr. E. Williams, Mayor Beattie, Dr. Hutchinson, Inspector McCallum, and Secretary Baker.
