tion, and the following were unani-  
mously chosen:  
President—Mr. Philip Pocock.  
Vice-presidents—Mr. Geo. S. Gibbons,  
Secretary—Mr. Geo. A. Fraser.

The question of naming an executive  
committee was discussed at some length, various  
methods of nominating them. It was  
at last decided that a committee be ap-  
pointed to select the executive, and  
report on a constitution.
