A FULL DAY FOR EVANGELIST

Rev. Mr. Crossley Concluded Four Sermons in London on Sunday.

ADDRESS ON THE BIBLE

At Sunday School Meetings the Evangelist Dealt With His Subject in Form of an Acrostic.

Sunday was a full day for Evangelist Crossley, as he conducted four services during the day—three in the Wellington Street Church and one in the Y. M. C. A.

In the morning his subject was "An Ideal Revival." He pictured the miracle of the loaves and fishes, and showed how the world may be evangelized, and a revival brought about in any place by Christians consecrating themselves to personal work, upon which God's blessing ever rests.

At the Sunday school service he gave an address on the Bible, putting it in the form of an acrostic, as he dilated on Buy a Bible. Investigate the Bible. Believe the Bible. Love the Bible. Employ the Bible.

He emphasized that youth is the time to begin the Christian life. In a meeting of 50 ministers, he ascertained the ages at which they became avowed Christians, and the average age was between 12 and 14 years.

Mr. Crossley's address in the Y. M. C. A. on "Hot Cakes From the Griddle," made the large assembly of men and young fellows sit up, and many resolves for a better life were formed.

In plain and appropriate speech he portrayed the folly, sin and result of profanity, disloyalty to Christ, bad company and impurity. His vigorous address will not soon be forgotten.

Evening Services. In the evening the Wellington Street Church was literally packed with an enthusiastic audience. As a prelude Mr. Crossley read the story of Daniel, in Daniel, vi, 1-10. He spoke of Daniel as a statesman. He was prime minister, finance minister and home minister.

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McMASTER DEGREES ARE RECOGNIZED

But Those of Western University Are Under Ban in Ontario.

CANADIAN CLUB LUNCH

Principal McCrimmon Was the Guest of Honor Today—Capt. Murphy's Pointed Remarks.

Principal McCrimmon, of McMaster University, Toronto, was the guest of honor at the luncheon of the Canadian club at noon today, and delivered an address on "Social Aspects of Canadian Life."

In introducing the speaker, Capt. Murphy, who presided, pointed out that the degrees of McMaster University were recognized by the educational department at Toronto.

"It is doing good work, but I cannot see why the degrees of the Western University are not recognized also," said Capt. Murphy. "Our students hold their own everywhere but in their own Province, where restrictions prevent them from showing the ability and training they possess."

Principal McCrimmon stated that it was true that McMaster degrees were recognized not only in Ontario, but elsewhere.

"It shows that a university does not have to be very large to do efficient undergraduate work," he declared. Launching into his subject, he declared that the future of Canada depended on two things, the nature of the population, and the natural surroundings.

In the latter Canada was particularly well situated. No country possessed such natural wealth. It was unparalleled. The riches of the mine, the forest, the seas and the soil were unequalled in any nation in the world.

Germany, now creating such a stir in the politics of the world, was small, and Canada could accommodate sixteen such nations within her borders.

While the material wealth of Canada was very great, there were more important things yet to consider. The most important was the nature and character of the people of the country. Floods of immigration were being

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CATHOLIC REGISTER SUED OVER A POEM

Osgoode Hall Judgment Clerk Says He Was Libelled by Church Organ.

[Canadian Press.] Toronto, Feb. 25.—D'Arcy Hinds, judgment clerk at Osgoode Hall, and an adherent of the Roman Catholic Church, has filed his statement of claim in an action for libel against the Catholic Church Extension Society, publishers of the Catholic Register, and its editors, Father Burke and Father Roche. The action is a result of a letter signed "A Member of No. 4," and purporting to come from a member of the Hibernian Society. This letter, which was published in the Register, commented on a published report of a rumor that Mr. Hinds had ceased to belong to the A. O. H. following the publication by him of a poem of welcome to Princess Patricia of Connaught. In the statement of claim filed today, Mr. Hinds alleges that he was called on by a standing committee of the "Huc" O'Neill Lodge of the A. O. H., to explain why he had authorized any poem complimentary to a member of the British royal family.

AGAINST CHURCH UNION. [Special to The Advertiser.] Byth, Feb. 26.—The result of the voting on church union was announced in the Presbyterian Church of York, as follows: Against union 233, for union 45.

DR. TAYLOR AGAINST UNION. Pastor of Cooke's Church Fears Loss of Individuality. Toronto, Feb. 26.—Dr. Andrew Taylor, D. D., preaching to a capacity congregation in Cooke's Church, Queen street, last evening, placed himself on record as being opposed to church union.

"If this union be formulated," said Dr. Taylor, "it will cost us the loss of a great name which bears upon it the scars and cares of generations of Christian progression and persecution. The Presbyterian Church is the only witnessing church for Christ which united with that of any other denomination, will lose this distinction and become merely a working church. The end proposed would mean the loss of our inspiration and, although we would save the evil of waste in church work, is this consideration worth the loss of our individuality?"

Discussing the statement of Dr. Miligan that the churches should unite against the Roman Catholics, the speaker said he was tired of the recent avalanche of sermons against that sect, and heartily wished that they were over. "To unite against the Church of Rome should be of no consideration," said he, "as the Presbyterians were united against them strongly enough as it was. In the past the Roman Church has represented despotism, while the Presbyterians had always stood for the purest form of democracy."

Albert Catton, of Victoria Hospital, Was Found in St. Thomas.

Albert Catton, the young engineer who disappeared from Victoria Hospital a few weeks ago without giving any clue as to his whereabouts, has been located in St. Thomas. Superintendent Heard, of the hospital, learned that Catton had been seen in St. Thomas, and he at once communicated with some people there, who forwarded the young man's address. Mr. Heard wrote to him and received a reply to his letter this morning.

Catton stated that he has been in St. Thomas since leaving London, but he was not aware that a search was being made for him, and that fears were expressed as to his safety. It is likely that the young man will come back to London.

Mr. Catton does not offer any explanation for his sudden departure. Mr. Heard is of the opinion that Catton will become more settled in St. Thomas, but he is letting one of the motors burn out.

FUNERALS POSTPONED OWING TO BLOCKADE
