SIX DROWNED, FIVE RESCUED IN QUEBEC LAKE FATALITY

Party of Eleven Were Crossing Lake in Upper Part of Province
When Their Boat Upset and an Entire Family
Was Wiped Out.

Chenouville, Que., May 31.—News of the drowning of six residents of the Township of Preston has filtered down to civilization from this centre of the lumbering camps, which is not connected with the outer world excepting by semi-weekly stage line. The accident occurred while they were crossing Lac Le Grande Poisson Blanc (Great Whitefish Lake), on Tuesday afternoon last. Eleven people altogether were in the boat when it upset, but five managed to save themselves by clinging to the overturned vessel. The drowned are: William Dublin, Mrs. William Dublin, their two young daughters, aged four and three years, respectively; Miss Albina Levert, aged 18, and Hillaire Palletment, aged 16, all of Preston.

The bodies of the victims have not been recovered, and Coroner Mackay, of Papineauville, is of the opinion that an inquest is unnecessary.

LONDON-PORT BURWELL LINE APPEARS TO BE ASSURED NOW

Municipalities Between This City and the Lake Are Willing
to Guarantee a Large Amount of Stock—A Meeting
On Friday Afternoon.

The municipalities lying between London and Port Burwell are willing to guarantee a large block of stock for the proposed electric line between the two places. A committee is busily engaged rounding up the farmers along the route, and when that is done application will probably be made for a franchise.

On Friday afternoon ex-Mayor G. B. Christie, Dr. Sinclair and W. A. Powell, of Aylmer, had an interview with Dr. Harry T. Reason, president of the board of trade, and explained the proposition. He reported the interview to the board at the meeting Friday evening.

"The municipalities have agreed to guarantee the bonds," said Dr. Reason.

LANCASTER BILL QUESTIONS MUST ALL BE ANSWERED

The Deputy Minister of Justice Directs Supreme Court to Over-
rule Quebec Counsel's Objections—The Argument
Concluded and Judgment Reserved.

Ottawa, May 31.—Submitting argument in rebuttal to the contention that the Federal Parliament had not the constitutional right to enact a general marriage law, Eugene Lafleur, K.C., this afternoon brought the hearing in the supreme court to an end. Judgment, of course, was reserved, and will probably not be given for several months, perhaps not till late in the fall. The next step will be to the Privy Council in England, and there is said to be little chance of that body being able to give a speedy judgment on the question involved.

Counsel's Contention.
The contention of the counsel representing the Province of Quebec to the supreme court ought not to take the question into consideration at all at this time, was attacked today by E. L. Newcombe, K.C., deputy minister of justice. Mr. Newcombe argued that the objections of the provinces must fall to the ground, in view of recent decisions by the judicial committee of the Privy Council. The reference of the questions to the court by the Government Mr. Newcombe described as a proper proceeding on the grounds of equity and public policy. The interests of Quebec were important, but the public interest was greater. He strongly urged the court to pass upon all three questions, including the second, despite the suggestion of Mr. Bellmuth of the contrary. The deputy minister took the position that a decision denying the right of Parliament to enact the Lancaster bill would mean that Parliament has no right to pass any such legislation.

What Court Was Asked.
The argument which came to an end this afternoon has coupled the attention of the supreme court for two sittings a day, since and including Monday. The court was called upon to consider three questions, submitted by the Dominion Government, arising out of the discussion on the Lancaster bill in Parliament, which, in turn, grew out of the agitation due to the operation of the "No Tenuis" decree. The Lancaster bill provided for a uniform marriage law for all Canada, recognizing as valid any marriage lawfully performed in any province. The questions submitted to the court called for a decision as to whether (a) Parliament had the right to enact the Lancaster bill (b) as to whether a marriage in Quebec between two Catholics or a Catholic and a Protestant before a non-Catholic functionary was legal and (c) what part of the Lancaster bill if any could be consistently enacted by the Parliament of Canada.

Under his direction it became a great institutional church, with a trade school, a parish building, a deaconess house, a seaside cottage, boys' and girls' clubs, and 8,000 communicants.

TO STUDY ICEBERGS

United States Officers Will Look for
Practical Information.

Washington, June 1.—An exhaustive study of the iceberg problem with a view to finding a practical method for determining the proximity of icebergs to ships will be conducted by three officers of the United States Bureau of Standards, who will leave Philadelphia on the steamer Chester next Sunday. The officials will take with them a large number of delicate instruments for measuring the temperature and other conditions in the water in the vicinity of icebergs.

STEAMER ASHORE.

Turks Islands, Bahamas, May 31.—The British steamer Antilla, which sailed from Liverpool on May 15 for Jamaica, ran ashore on a reef at the northeast extremity of Grand Turk yesterday afternoon. The vessel lies easily and is not leaking. Her crew and passengers remain on board in no danger. Lights are alongside and the coal has been jettisoned, though the cargo has not been touched. It is believed that the craft will be saved.
