

Canon Hague's Charges Denied by Authorities

Toronto, June 13.—Police officials today denied that there is any foundation for the statement by Canon Hague before the Toronto Synod last night to the effect that two hundred girls from this city are every year enticed across the boundary by "white slavers." They say that a case of the kind is very exceptional.

Canadian Courts Decide For Mother

Not Guilty of Abduction Charge, and Gets Daughter.

Detroit, June 13.—Mrs. Della Huber-Blythe, who was freed Wednesday by the petit jury at Sandwich of the charge of abducting her daughter, Evelyn, was permitted by Judge George Smith on Thursday to take the little girl.

The judge ruled that the verdict of the jury placed the custody of the child in the possession of the mother, she having been acquitted of the criminal charge and the relationship of the mother and child therefore stood the same as they had previous to the charge being laid.

Before Mrs. Blythe left the court, her counsel, Mayor Henry Day, of Windsor, asked the judge some protection for the mother, stating that he had heard certain reports that an attempt would be made to spirit the child back across the boundary. Crown Attorney Rodd assured the court that no effort would be made to take the child away. He had wanted Huber, he said, that any such proceeding would be severely dealt with.

Edward Huber now has only one hope left to regain his daughter, and that is through the civil courts. He was in the court at Sandwich Thursday, and after the case was closed intimated that his fight was ended, and that developments would follow shortly.

DOG WAS MAD

Three Canadian Children Rushed to Hospital for Treatment.

DIDN'T KNOW OF DIVORCE UNTIL HUSBAND WED AGAIN

Sarnia Woman Says Nobody Notified Her of Suit—Bridegroom Says Proceedings Were Legally Published.

Sarnia, June 13.—Another woman who did not know her husband had been divorced from her until she happened to see an account of his union with another in a newspaper, is Mrs. Alexandria Viro, of this town.

About two years ago Viro moved from Sarnia to Port Huron, according to her statement, his wife refused to accompany him or to live with him afterward. About a year ago he instituted proceedings for divorce. The wife appeared against him, through her attorney, and the case was supposedly dropped. According to the wife, this was the last she had heard of Viro's making any attempt to divorce her.

Records at the office of the county clerk show that on Jan. 7, a bill for divorce was filed by the husband charging desertion. The wife lived here, and service was made upon her by publication of proceedings in a St. Clair newspaper.

Tuesday, June 3, a decree of divorce was granted by Judge Tappan. Wednesday morning, Viro appeared before the county clerk and was given a marriage license. Wednesday afternoon he was wedded to Miss Collinge Collinge. A account of the union was published, and that same evening Mrs. Viro was almost prostrated when she saw that her husband had been married to another woman. Now she has engaged an attorney to set aside the decree.

Engineers Off For Petawawa Camp

Advance Party Leaves Today, and Main Body Tomorrow.

Under command of Capt. E. V. G. Buchanan, an advance party of eight members of London's military engineering corps—Seventh Field Company, Canadian Engineers—leave for Petawawa camp this afternoon via the C. P. R. at 5:35 p.m. The main body of the company will leave Saturday at noon under command of Major F. W. Farman, officer commanding.

This is the first year that London has been represented in the ranks of the militia engineering corps, but from the care exercised in recruiting the Seventh, the Forest City detachment is expected to make more than a creditable showing at the Petawawa manoeuvres. Unlike the majority of corps that go to camp each year, no effort has been made to "fill" the ranks. The engineers are, practically speaking, picked men. Quality rather than quantity has been the watchword in recruiting the corps.

All Skilled Mechanics. No one but a mechanic and a skilled mechanic, at that, has been taken on the strength of the company. The majority of the men are either journeymen carpenters or masons, or are mechanics from McClary's Whites, the Rolling Mills, or some of the larger establishments of similar character in the city. There is a telegraph section of the corps, and the men are all operators, linemen, or electricians.

Practical engineering work will be done by the corps. Bridge building, construction of work fortifications, and the construction and operation of field telegraph service will be part of the "stunts" pulled off. Conditions will be as near actual active service as can possibly be made. Pontoon bridges will be thrown across streams, earthworks thrown up, and fortifications built.

The officers of the corps are all practical engineers. Major Buchanan, being one of the best-known civil engineers of Western Ontario. Capt. Buchanan is electrical engineer of the city hydro-electric service. Lieut. W. H. Williams is a C. P. R. engineer, whilst

Lieut. F. W. Archer is one of the engineering staff of the London Electric Company.

Jap Premier Expects Peaceful Settlement

Regrets That Alien Land Dispute Is Not Yet Settled.

Tokio, June 13.—Count Gombei Yamamoto, the Japanese premier, today declared that he deeply regretted that the controversy over the question of the Californian alien land ownership legislation was still unsettled. He was addressing a gathering of Japanese journalists on the subject of foreign politics.

The premier said that with due regard to the importance of maintaining peace and friendship between Japan and the United States, the Japanese Government was taking appropriate steps and looked confidently for an amicable settlement.

He also announced that the Government was introducing administrative reforms, which would effect an economy of \$25,000,000.

HEBREW TEACHERS

Montreal Board Aims To Prevent Recurrence of Strike.

TWO DROWNED

Hundreds Watched Attempted Rescue of City Employees at Calgary.

Calgary, Alta., June 13.—Matt Schatz and John Anetta, two city employees, were drowned yesterday in a river, while trying to rescue G. H. Sparrow, of Airdrie, who had jumped into the river to save Anetta's wagon and team, which had been swept down the river. Sparrow, who attacked Sparrow in turn to save Schatz and Anetta, also narrowly escaped drowning. The bodies of Schatz and Anetta have not been recovered.

TORONTO, June 12.—The wheat market was strong. The market for Manitoba. Dry weather is still reported in the West. Ontario grades are quiet and firm, with little offering. Market for wheat and corn futures are again higher in Liverpool. Oats are firmer for Manitoba. The Chicago market is strong to rule strong. July wheat in Winnipeg sold at \$1.10, the highest of the year. Four—Ontario wheat, four, are scarce, and firmer; 90 per cent patents quoted at \$4 to \$4.10. Montreal or Toronto freights: Manitoba are firmer, first best patents, in June bags, \$5.30; second patents, in June bags, \$4.80; strong bakers, in June bags, \$4.60. Manitoba wheat, Marked Canada, with prices higher; No. 1 northern quoted at \$1.05, on track at bay ports; No. 2 at \$1.02. No. 3 white and red wheat are quoted at \$1.00 to \$1.05 outside, and inferior at \$0.95 to \$1.00.
