

DUKE OF BRUNSWICK DRIVEN INSANE BY LOSS OF HIS MEN

London, July 26.—2:37 a.m.—The Copenhagen correspondent of the Express sends a story regarding the illness of the Duke of Brunswick, the German emperor's son-in-law, story, however, not being confirmed

from any other source. "The Duke of Brunswick," says the prrespondent, "who has been the victim of profound melancholia since the early days of the war, is now declared to be hopelessly insane. His mental collapse was the result of a trying experience while commanding a detachment of German troops on the Russian frontier, when he witnessed the tragic fate of his men, all of whom were swallowed up in a treacherous marsh.'

The Duke of Brunswick, as Prince Ernest August of Cumberland, married Princess Victoria Luise, daughter of the German emperor, at Berlin in May, 1913. In March, 1915, a Copenhagen dispatch reported the duke to be suffering from a nervous breakdown, which was considered probably incurable.

HUNS GIVEN ETHER BEFORE THE ATTACK **UPON AUSTRALIANS**

Knife, Bayonet, Revolver and Grenade Used in the Fighting.

Paris, July 26.-4:40 p.m.-The fighting in the fortified viltage of Pozieres between the British and the Germans is described as follows by an officer who was wounded in the struggle. "Early Sunday morning, at the moment the signal for the attack was given, after a frightfully intense bombardment, the English infantry rushed forward to the entrance of the village, carried it brilliantly and occupied the first houses. At 11:30 o'clock the Germans counter-attacked. Their onset was extraordinary, doubtless because their courage had been stimulated by ether, as one could tell from the odor.

German Officer's Weapon. "Here the rifle played no part-the knife, bayonet, revolver and grenade were the only weapons used. over 250 children. The lieutenant struck the Bavarian a blow on the chest with his sword and was leaking caught fire. Disregarding his sufferings, the lieutenant had just strength enough left to deliver another blow. This proved mortal to the Bavarian. Unfortunately the lieutenant died shortly afterwards.
