The communique issued last night tovered the ground of the conversa-tion, said the premier, but he added: It is highly desirable that America thould be represented at the inter-illied conference of July 16. 

The burning question in secondary school circles in London is the matter of accommodation for 1924-25 classes. The June registration scheme, operation of which has just been completed, is reported to have been highly satisfactory. Rough estimates from this census indicate that there will be more students in every secondary school district of the city in September.

With principals working on the completion of examinations just now, no definite figures on the registration campaign are available. However, Principal Miller states that with 830 students as the maximum capacity for the present term, some 850 students are already registered to enter classes in September. At the same time it is not believed that the registration scheme was 100 per cent efficient, and other pupils may yet want to enter the school.
