TORIES TO BEGIN ACTIVE BATTLE WITH LABORITES

Will Move Adoption of Vote of Censure Against Labor Government.

London, May 8.—Conservative party leaders next week will begin an active campaign against the Labor government in the House of Commons. The first attack will take the form of a proposal to adopt a vote of censure against the government for its proposed abolition of duties on foreign motor cars, glassware, fabrics and gloves.

During the first few months of the Labor government's life the Conservative opposition followed a moderate policy, refraining from attacking the inexperienced cabinet except on major issues. This policy aroused intense dissatisfaction among the younger Conservatives, who insisted upon a continual attack at every opportunity. Their advice is now accepted by the older Tories, who intend bringing former ministers into the debates frequently and subjecting the Labor administration to the most searching criticism.

Hereafter, former Premier Baldwin, Austin Chamberlain, Sir Robert Horne and others will be found actively opposing the Labor proposals, even minor administrative acts, which hitherto have passed unnoticed. The Labor ministers continually taunt the Conservatives with their lack of courage, and declare the opposition is afraid to challenge the government, because an appeal to the electorate would mean another Labor gain.

It is possible that the Conservative attacks may soon take the form of a vote of lack of confidence, bringing about defeat of Prime Minister Ramsay MacDonald. The Conservative leaders are organizing a country-wide drive to maintain high duties on foreign motors. They expect to enlist the aid of trades unions composed of motor manufacturing employers and to bring scores of delegations to London as a protest. Chancellor of the Exchequer Snowden stands his ground on his budget proposals, and refuses to alter the program even as a means of satisfying his own supporters.

POPE PIUS RECEIVES RUSSIAN CHURCH HEAD

Archbishop Zepiak, Freed by Soviet Authorities, Arrives in Rome.

Rome, May 8.—Pope Pius this evening received in private audience Archbishop Zepiak, head of the Catholic Church in Russia, who recently was set free by the Soviet authorities after having been held in prison for more than a year. When he departed, the Russian prelate paid a visit to Cardinal Gasparri.

"I cannot express any opinion of the political situation in Russia, because I was only set free from prison, where I had remained for more than a year, three weeks ago," said the archbishop tonight.

Take No Action On Temperance

Women Voters To Hold Impartial Attitude.

Toronto, May 8.—By a majority vote the Toronto League of Women Voters, at a general meeting today, decided to maintain an impartial attitude on the temperance question. This action was taken on a communication from the Ontario Women's Christian Temperance Union inviting the co-operation of the league in the movement to support and preserve the O. T. A. In moving that no action be taken, Mrs. Edgar Jarvis stated that the question was a contentious one, upon which the members of the league held divergent views.

O.A.L.A. Quits A.A.U. of Canada

Announcement Is Made by Secretary of Executive.

Toronto, May 8.—It was announced tonight by Secretary Harcourt of the Ontario Amateur Lacrosse Association that he had been instructed by the executive to inform the Ontario branch of the A. A. U. of C. that the O. A. L. A. had withdrawn from affiliation. The question was thoroughly discussed at the annual meeting on Good Friday, when a motion to break away from the amateur body was left to the executive.

The trouble arose from the Ontario branch granting amateur cards to players who played professional soccer in the Old Country and Canada. The O. A. L. A., after the annual meeting, requested the Ontario branch to extend this privilege to other branches of sport, but the letter was ignored. Similar action is being discussed by enthusiasts and officers in two or three other lines of sport.

ST. JAMES WITHDRAWN FROM KENTUCKY DERBY

With Sarazen's Retirement As Well, Wise Counsellor Now Rules Favorite.

New York, May 8.—The ranks of 3-year-old thoroughbreds preparing for the annual spring classics sustained another hard blow today when St. James, George D. Widener's, renowned colt, pulled up lame after a workout, and was withdrawn from the Preakness and Kentucky Derby, two \$50,000 races in which he was among the favorites. Sarazen, noted Vanderbilt gelding, who was highly regarded for the Derby, was withdrawn after being defeated by the Rancocas stable's Bracadele.

The withdrawal of St. James and Sarazen leaves Wise Counsellor, Kentucky crack, as the outstanding favorite for the Derby, but there have also been reports that this colt was not in the best of condition, following failure to start him at Pimlico yesterday.
