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PROTESTS PLAN TO RUN EMPTY CARS ON BRIDGE

Alderman Douglass Objects to
L. S. R.'s Use of Condemned
Ridout Structure.

ALLOWED BY BOARD
City Solicitor Will Be Asked
To Take Action On
Matter.

Ald. Douglass at last night's meeting of the finance committee, objected strenuously to the action of the London Street Railway in sending empty cars over the Ridout street bridge after it had been condemned.

"I do not think that it is fair," he said, "that the company should ask its conductors and motormen to cross a bridge that has been condemned by the Ontario railway board."

City Engineer Near told the committee that the Ontario railway board has given the company permission to take cars over the Ridout street bridge "at the company's risk."

Ald. Douglass wanted immediate action by the city to prevent this action, and urged that it should be taken up as a matter separate from the rest of the railway situation.

Mr. Near said again that in the decision of the board to close the bridge it added a clause to the effect that the closing of the bridge was not to be considered a breach of the franchise bylaw with the city.

In connection with this statement, the mayor held that the matter of the bridge could not be treated as a separate matter from the whole question, and that it rested entirely with the city solicitor. Ald. Douglass objected vigorously. He said that it was a matter of the safety of the men on the empty cars, and argued for immediate action, without getting much satisfaction from the committee.

Is Up To Solicitor.
"The whole thing is in the hands of the city solicitor, I imagine," remarked the mayor.
"Then all I can say is you've got a fine imagination," returned the alderman.

After statements were read from the fire chiefs of Vancouver, Edmonton, Winnipeg, Calgary, Ottawa, Halifax, Hull, strongly condemning "assembled pumps and fire equipment," the finance committee last night decided to recommend the acceptance of a standard pump for the London fire department. Two tenders were made, one from the American La France Company for \$15,750, and the other from the Seagraves Company for \$17,650. On motion of Ald. Douglass, the lower tender was accepted subject to the approval of the city solicitor.

Requirements Met.
In spite of objections from the mayor that the specifications sent out by the city allow of competition in the matter of tendering, it was found on examination that both companies agreed to meet the city requirements in pumps. The mayor stated that the pump could not be bought this year as there was no money in the estimates, and that there was no legal way of using any city funds for this purpose.

Maurice Gootson appeared before the committee, apologized to the fire chief for a statement he had made that the chief had accused him of setting fire to his own storehouse, and also in an attack on the city police. He said that the police had failed to afford him the protection that he needed, and after a long explanation, the committee instructed the mayor to bring the matter to the attention of the police commission and report back.

A grant of \$400 was made to the Orangemen for the coronation here on July 11, and another of \$100 to the Amputees association, subject to there being funds available for the purpose.

**EXPEDITION FOR RELIEF
OF POLE FLYERS URGED**

**Norwegian Thinks Steps Ought
To Be Taken To Find
Party.**

Oslo, Norway, May 27.—The Norwegian minister of defence, Rolf Jacobsen, in an interview today, expressed the opinion that steps ought to be taken soon to organize an expedition for the relief of Captain Roald Amundsen and his party, he believing that the naval authorities might be asked whether two aeroplanes could be sent to Spitzbergen in search of the explorer.

**TECHNICAL SCHOOL CONTRACT
AWARDED TO HAYMAN, SONS**

East Wing Addition Will Cost
Board of Education
\$53,000.

BUY PROPERTY
Advisory Vocational Committee Promises Opening by
Autumn.

John Hayman and Sons, London, will build the new addition to the London technical and commercial high school. The advisory vocational committee of the board of education has let the contract for the work to the local firm at a cost of \$53,000.

The addition will be built on the east side of the present technical school building, and will be completed in readiness for occupancy this coming fall.

After considerable time and trouble the committee purchased the property on which to build the addition as follows: M. S. Cater, 37 feet off the rear of his property facing on William Street, \$1,500; J. E. Chapman, 70 feet off the rear of his property facing on King Street, \$4,000; Miss E. Howie, her property facing on William Street, \$1,500; which there is a frame cottage, \$6,000. (The cottage will be used by the committee and rented to the caretaker of the school.)

The amount to be paid by the advisory vocational committee to the board for the services of L. E. Carruthers, superintendent of building and caretaking, in preparing the plans and specifications for the new addition has been fixed at \$2,000.

Comprises Eight Classrooms.
Before deciding to build the addition to the east wing of the present building, the committee secured contract prices also for the addition to be built on the west wing. The difference between the lowest tenders on the east side and on the west side was approximately \$6,000, arising from the fact that the plumbing and heating plants can be installed at a much lower figure on the east than on the west side. After careful consideration the committee felt that in the interests of economy and looking to future additions to the building it would be advisable to build the addition proposed at this time on the east side of the building.

The addition, which will consist of eight classrooms, is the second which has been made to the present technical school building since it was first opened in 1913. Two rooms will be separated by folding doors and accommodation provided for carrying on the physical training work of the technical school. This move will obviate the necessity of the classes leaving the building to secure their training in this particular work.

At the Y. M. C. A., as has been the case for the past year or so, more adequate accommodation will be provided when the new addition is completed for the ever-growing attendance at the school, which now stands at 900 day students and approximately 1,100 evening class students.

Within Estimated Cost.
Other firms tendering for the contract were: John Petherbridge and Hyatt Bros., both of London, and B. B. Smith and Pickett and Healy, both of Toronto.

The work of having plans and specifications prepared for the addition, on which to build the addition, has all been carried out by a sub-committee of the advisory vocational committee, consisting of Trustees William G. Murray, Harry Hayman, S. P. Lawrason, chairman of the board of education, and H. B. Beal, principal of the technical school.

Since the cost of the addition, building and equipment, has been placed at \$70,000, half of which will be paid by the provincial government, the advisory committee still has \$3,500 with which to equip the addition.

Incidentally, the equipment required will not reach that sum, and hence, once again, the advisory committee will have carried through the erection of an addition to the school at a figure well within the estimated cost.

STUDENTS SCORE IN SHAVAN PLAY

Shaw, "Pygmalion" and University Talent Meets Complete Success.

First-rate histrionic ability, coupled with a well-selected cast trained to perfection brought a complete success to the University of Western Ontario year play, Shaw's "Pygmalion," as presented by the literary society in the auditorium, college of arts, last night.

In "Pygmalion" Shaw has taken the age-old argument of heredity versus environment, not to settle the question but to use it as a background for his stimulating criticism and devastating wit.

The Pygmalion is Henry Higgins, professor of phonetics, who guarantees to make a lady out of a gutter-snipe flower girl in six months. He passes the girl off as a duchess at a fashionable garden party within the stated time.

Through it all runs the Shavian bombardment of epigrams. He scorns the wealthy. He scoffs at the poor. The firm beliefs of men are ridiculed. The sacred credos of the women are exposed. The clergy and the military are a fair target for his titters.

Woman Is Pursuer.
At one time his teachings are subtle wiles, dropped as in confidence for those who think they understand him. In the next breath he turns to the pure joshing of the rustic, ever returning to the game with swift, sure, piercing of the favorite boasts of the layers of human strata.

And then in the fifth act to finish with a flourish, he shouts his axiom. Woman is the relentless pursuer of the male. And lets it go at that.

Such is Shaw and such is Pygmalion, comedy, buffoonery, satire, a touch of the pathetic, almost, at times to be relieved by further attacks on pet superstitions with the old ammunition of his own manufacture.

It was splendid. The laurels go to every member of the cast, but the highest honors go to Helen Jordan, who, as the little flower girl, and later, the near-duchess, won a complete victory.

The portrayal of the role left nothing to be desired. Miss Berdan interpreted every mood, every movement, every line with a thorough understanding of the work in hand, and, incidentally, wore her charming goods becomingly.

Good Supporting Cast.
Sydney King, 25, under the opposite, gave the desired effect as the inconsiderate, selfish and, where women were concerned, stupid man. J. MacKenzie Dobson supported him as Major Pickering.

Helen Hughes played Mrs. Higgins and Florence McDonagh Mrs. Pearce, the housekeeper. Gerald Jordan played Alfred Doolittle. Others in the cast were Grace Sabine, Marion Stark, John Wilkey, Margaret Goodwin, Constance Strothers, Gar E. Wilson, Allan Grant, Richard Hungerford and Fred Ross.

Besides the fact that the university students produce the good plays in their own theatre with their own orchestra, led by Walter Rennie, lies the realization that as well as giving satisfactory entertainment, they are making important contributions to the little theatre movement in Canada.
