**CANADIANS FLEE  
MISSION IN CHINA**

**Methodist Workers and Chil-  
dren Leave Chungking  
Under Escort.**

Associated Press Despatch.  
Toronto, July 7.—The Methodist  
mission board here today received  
a cable from Chungking that 48  
Canadians had left that place for  
Shanghai under escort, because of  
further trouble in West China. The  
cable was from Rev. Gordon Jones,  
formerly of Brantford. Three sta-  
tions of the West China mission are  
affected. Mission workers seemed to  
have congregated at Chungking, fol-  
lowing riots recently reported there.  
The party leaving Chungking should  
reach Shanghai in ten days. It is  
stated here by those acquainted with  
the country and methods of travel.  
The cable requested that all W. M. S.  
workers at Shanghai, and it is taken for  
granted that all the missionaries and  
mission workers at Chungking have left  
Shanghai.

The cable reads as follows:  
"Following left here today: Mrs.  
Abbey and children, Mr. and Mrs.  
Annis and children, Mr. and Mrs.  
Burwell and children, Miss Irene  
Harris, Mrs. Jones and children, Mrs.  
McNaughton, Mr. and Mrs. Morrison  
and children, Dr. Sheridan, Mr. and  
Mrs. P. Smith and children, Miss  
Sparling and two children, Miss  
Jack, Miss Shepley, Miss Elderkin  
and Miss Peters."

The last four women mentioned  
are Methodist W. M. S. workers, but  
this list is incorrect, as two of them  
are not on the field. It is assumed at  
Wesley building that all W. M. S.  
workers at Chungking, six in num-  
ber, have left with the party now  
under escort. The six are Misses In-  
nes, Darby, McNeil, Sparling, Peters  
and Jack.

The cable makes no reference to  
the Chengtu area, where by far the  
larger number of Canadian mission-  
aries are located, and from which  
nothing but reassuring cables have  
come.

Chungking has evidently been the  
centre for several days past of an  
anti-foreign activity, which made it  
unwise for the families of mission-  
aries to remain.

Of the persons leaving, 25 are mis-  
sionaries' children, seven married  
male workers, eight single mis-  
sionaries, and two single women em-  
ployed by the general board of mis-  
sions. Rev. E. W. Wallace, D.D., to  
whom replies are directed, is a Can-  
adian Methodist missionary resident  
in Shanghai, so that Shanghai is  
taken to be the party's destination.

At least one of the 48 missionaries  
compelled to flee Chungking is a  
Londoner. Mrs. H. B. Burwell is a  
daughter of Mr. H. McPherson, 155  
Wharncliffe road. She has been in  
the mission field for nine years, and  
until two years ago was stationed  
along with her husband and family  
in Chengtu.

Burwell was a visitor with her par-  
ents in London while on furlough.  
In a letter received by Mr. McPherson  
on Monday Mrs. Burwell men-  
tioned the disturbances occasioned  
by the anti-foreign agitation, but  
gave no hint that the animosity to  
the missionaries was so great as to  
compel them to abandon their post.  
During the last few weeks, though,  
the degree of anti-foreign feeling  
has become so intensified in China as  
to include even the missionaries.

The Advertiser was informed last  
night that three other workers from  
Western Ontario are included in the  
party now on its way to Shanghai.

**WIFE SHOTS ACTOR.**

## Flags Flying At Half-Mast As Whole City Sorrow Following Lake Tragedy

St. Thomas Mourns Death of  
Eight Picnickers at Pina-  
fore Park.

**TELL OF HEROISM**  
Bravery of Ministers and Two  
Girl Heroes Are  
Lauded.

Special to The Advertiser.  
St. Thomas, July 7.—Flags flying  
at half-mast on schools and other  
public buildings all over the city  
gave visible expression today to the  
mourning of all citizens for the vic-  
tims of Monday night's tragedy at  
Pinafore park.

The paralysis and numbness caused  
by the first shock of the disaster,  
having passed, people began to talk  
freely of the occurrence, and many  
tales of heroism and presence of  
mind on the part of rescuers and  
those in the boat were told.

**Ministers Are Brave.**  
With characteristic modesty, Rev.  
Percy N. Harding, rector of St. John's  
church, which most of the victims  
attended, forbore to say anything  
about his part in the work of rescue,  
but commended highly the skill and  
bravery shown by his colleague, Rev.  
C. M. C. Hallowell, rector of St.  
Luke's, who went out in one of the  
rowboats and dived repeatedly in  
the hope of recovering bodies, and  
later lent skillful assistance in a  
vain attempt to resuscitate some of  
the victims. Eyewitnesses tell of the  
devotion shown by Mr. Harding, who  
is an ex-Londoner and a graduate of  
Huron college, as is also Mr. Hall-  
owell.

He was not a witness of the  
tragedy, but was quickly on the  
scene afterwards. He was unable to  
swim, and so felt that his presence  
out on the water would not have been  
of particular use. He undertook the  
difficult task of calming the hyster-  
ical women who thronged about him  
on the bank, an undertaking demand-  
ing coolness and strong nerves. One  
of the rescued kiddies went home  
wrapped in his coat, and Mr. Hard-  
ing remained at the scene until dawn  
in his shirt-sleeves. Before allowing  
himself any rest he visited every one  
of the bereaved homes.

**Blame Underboot.**  
Several of the children who were  
saved are positive that all was not  
well with the boats underneath the  
raft before the upset. George Austin,  
aged 14, told The Advertiser that  
Norman Ward shouted to them to  
rush up to the front. The rear of the  
craft seemed to be settling even  
then, and the water rose very fast  
before there was any thought of the  
boat overturning, he maintains. He  
was positive that there was no men-  
tion made of any mutterings, and his  
story is corroborated by his two  
brothers, Alfred, aged 12, and Harold,  
aged 9.

The former swam to some bathers  
who were making their way to the  
scene, and was assisted to shore in  
an exhausted condition by Pete Lin-  
der, and George held his brother  
Harold by the side of the overturned  
boat, and was picked up by the  
Wilfred sisters, Lillian and Queenie.  
The two girls rendered conspicu-  
ous service in the work of rescue.

Both are Girl Guides, and their com-  
mander, Mrs. Wilson, spoke today of  
the pride their fellow-guides feel in  
the way they conducted themselves.  
They were in the water in a rowboat  
along with Phyllis Stevenson and  
James Russell. They were instru-  
mental in rescuing eight in their  
boat.

**Apparatus Lacking.**  
The complete lack of life-saving  
apparatus at the miniature lake was  
commented upon by Mr. Hallowell, in  
discussing the tragedy with The  
Advertiser. It was not until boat-  
hooks and grappling-irons had been  
brought from downtown that any  
serious effort could be made to  
locate the bodies. Diving was very  
difficult, as the water was from 12  
to 15 feet deep, and a five-foot  
blanket of very cold water lay over  
the bottom, quickly causing cramps  
in those who went down into it. Mr.  
Hallowell thinks that if boat-hooks  
had been available at the pavilion  
many of the bodies would have been  
recovered much sooner, although it  
is doubtful if resuscitation methods  
would have availed to save additional  
lives.

**BRITISH FREIGHTER AGROUND.**

freighter Westmoreland, a ship of  
about 3,500 gross tons, which left  
Adelaide, Australia, May 30, for Lon-  
don, via Trinidad, went aground today  
on the rocks at the entrance to this

way.

**COMBINED ACTION  
SOUGHT BY MINERS**

**Coal Mining Crisis Takes On  
New Aspect As Result of  
Conference.**

Associated Press Despatch.  
London, July 7.—The situation in  
the British coal mining industry  
continues to occupy chief notice in  
the press. The cabinet is consider-  
ing the problem today, while an  
international aspect has been intro-  
duced through the meeting of the  
executive committee of the Interna-  
tional Miners' Federation at which  
delegates from France, Belgium,  
Holland and Germany and Czecho-  
Slovakia were present.

While it is not believed combined  
action is contemplated in the present  
dispute between British mine owners  
and workers, Frank Hodges, secre-  
tary of the miners' federation, point-  
ed out this morning there is a coal  
crisis in nearly every country, and  
he emphasized the importance of in-  
ternational organization and action.

While no official intervention is  
contemplated at the present stage of  
the dispute, it is known that every  
angle is being explored behind the  
scenes in order to bring the disputing  
international elements together. New  
developments are expected from the  
meeting of the mine owners' repre-  
sentatives tomorrow.

**Osteopathic Association Told  
Parasites Are Cause of  
Twinges.**

Toronto, July 7.—Dr. H. R. Nichols  
of Boston told the American Osteo-  
pathic association in convention here  
today that rheumatism was no longer  
fashionable. The cause of the  
"rheumatic twinges" is a parasite  
that may lodge at the root of the  
teeth or in decayed tonsils, he said.  
Dr. Nichols also declared that such  
troubles as appendicitis, ne-  
phritis, etc., were the focusing of the  
same germs at certain points in the  
body.

Dr. Robert D. Emery of Los  
Angeles, in an address, sought to  
show that cancer was not a germ  
disease. He thought cancer was pre-  
ventable in youth by proper food and  
exercise.

**TRADE PACT AIDS  
LONDON INDUSTRY**

Canadian Shoes To Receive  
2-3 Preference From  
W. Indies.

Canadian Press Despatch.  
Ottawa, July 7.—The Canadian-  
West Indies trade agreement, details  
of which will be made public Thurs-  
day, prepares the way for greatly ex-  
tended trade between the islands and  
the dominion. Trade will be extend-  
ed by mutual preferential tariffs and  
by steamship subsidies, to which  
both parties will contribute.

Canada will benefit by increased  
market facilities in receiving tariff  
preferences on flour, lumber, boots,  
butter, cheese, meats, apples and  
cement. It is understood that lum-  
ber and boots will have a two-thirds  
preference; butter, \$3.50 a hundred;  
meats, \$1.50 a barrel; apples, 50c a  
barrel, and fish, 50c a hundred.

West Indian products entering  
Canada will receive approximately a  
25 per cent preference, and in the  
case of bananas, 50 per cent. Free  
free, the tariff against the countries  
will be increased. It is notable  
that sugar will be on the prefer-  
ence. Grape fruit, pineapples, raw  
cocoa and limes are on the free  
list. Rum has a two-thirds prefer-  
ence.

Speculations as to the amount of  
the steamship subsidy and the nature  
of the service vary. Some estimates  
of the amount to be distributed by  
the islands for the improved steam-  
ship service are as high as \$200,000,  
others \$125,000. In any event, it is  
understood that ships of 5,000 or  
6,000 ton capacity, with passengers  
and cold storage accommodation, will  
provide a fortnightly service all the  
year around. The agreement, which  
was signed last night, is subject to  
the ratification of parliament, and  
will come into effect on a date to be  
mutually agreed upon by the con-  
tracting parties. As signed, it pro-  
vides for a ten year contract which  
can be terminated thereafter on a  
year's notice.

\$16,000,000 Automotive Mer-  
ger Completed by Manu-
