BERLIN, May 31.—Despite France's as-surances that there is no denger of war be-tween France and Chins, the commerce of Germany with China has already been much disturbed. It is hoped here that if France declares the blockade of the Chinese ports, Great Britain and America will refuse to recognize it. The French blockade can-not be effective, and Germany will certainly support England and America in opposing it.
