

SHOT DEAD IN A BAGNIO.

HOW DAVID HAMILTON LOST HIS LIFE AT ORILLIA.

A sequel to a series of bold burglaries, the case of David Hamilton, who was shot dead in a bagnio at Orillia, Ont., June 11.

Orillia, Ont., June 11.—Frank Keen and Thomas Malahy are dry goods merchants at Orillia, and their private residences are on the Misamis street. A little over a month ago both their houses were entered during the night by burglars. From Mr. Keen they took a gold watch valued at \$450 and \$10 in money, and from Malahy a valuable gold watch and chain, his daughter's gold necklace and the sum of \$150.

Believing that the local police were incompetent to deal with the case they telegraphed to Private Detective Matt. Howie of Toronto, who in company with Dr. Coose came to this town and began on the case and obtained a clue.

Howie returned to Toronto and left the doctor here to keep at the work. Some traces of the missing articles led to a house of ill-repute, and early this morning went there with Constable Cotton.

Intending to arrest the inmates and then search the house, upon going into the house they found a man who resisted arrest. A scuffle ensued and David Hamilton, one of them, was shot. He died in a short time.

Coroner Kames held an inquest to-day and several witnesses were examined. Nelson Tollman, who was in the house at the time, swore that the two men came in and ordered them out. The dead man and Tollman asked for their authority and the "detective" produced a revolver. He thought the shooting was accidental.

Howie, Brandon and Mabel Ornt, in-questers, were examined and swore positively that Hamilton was shot deliberately by the "detective."

Constable Cotton gave important evidence from which it appears that they were at the house at 11 o'clock on the morning of May 25th, 1884. The two were ordered to leave, but refused. They were then told that the man was dead.

DOCTOR COOSE. The man who has thus distinguished himself in Orillia, although said to be possessed of some ability, might be classed with the genus cranium. He was born in Ottawa, but developing a taste for the States in early years he migrated to Chicago, where he was connected with a World reporter. In a conversation with a World reporter, he gave a portion of his history. He said he had served as a captain under Gen. Grant, and had been in several army of Virginia, and had been in several army engagements. After the war he became a "kind of a lawyer" and fitted around the country a good deal. At Washington, St. Louis and Chicago he made himself known. While in Chicago last fall he alleged that he became possessed of information of a felon plan to blow up the parliament buildings at Ottawa.

When parliament met he made all haste to the capital and inquired of the doctor. John offered to sell his information to the government. The government looked upon him as a crank, and the matter was dropped. He then went to Montreal, where he struck Toronto, and strange to say he arrived on the night preceding the very day that the dynamite cartridges were placed under the window sills of the parliament buildings.

Mr. Coose was never interested with the authorities. He has been living in Toronto ever since. He lately associated himself with Matt.
