Toronto, Feb. 12.—The run at the City Cattle Market to-day was 51 loads, with 665 head of cattle, 458 sheep and lambs, 650 hogs and 32 calves.

It was a rather small market to-day, following the unusually heavy runs for the last few markets. There was, however, a good inquiry for cattle. notwithstanding the heavy purchasing of last week. Choice butcher cattle are in a very active demand and there was a fair market for everything offering, from choicest export to commonest butcher, though of the latter variety it must be said there is at no time any scarcity. On the whole the market was firm to-day, though prices were not quotable higher. The run being so light as it was, there might be 103 to 15c higher for a few ordinary butcher and good cows, but the advance was not general.
