Berlin Pupils' Most Excellent Record

LEON PEQUEGNAT HEADS THE LIST
WITH A TOTAL OF 905 MARKS

The North Waterloo Entrance Ex-
aminers have completed their work,
and handed out the lists this morning.
The pass list is unusually large and the
showing of the Berlin candi-
dates is a cause for gratification.

Of the 15 highest pupils eight are
from the Berlin Central, and the four
highest marks were made by four
Central School boys, Leon Peque-
gnat, son of Geo. Pequegnat, lead-
ing with 905 out of a total of 1100
obtainable.

The minimum pass list is 550. The
total percentage of candidates pass-
ed is larger than in most Counties,
due largely to our system of pro-
motion examinations.

Principal Forsyth of the High
School, says there will not be room
at the High School to accommodate
all the pupils, and those who present
themselves on the first day of
school will get the preference.

An "Honor Roll" has been made up of
the candidates that secured 800
marks or over, out of the total of

Berlin's Industrial Demonstration

The Board of Trade Breaking Ground For The Event

Berlin's Industrial celebration pro-
ject advanced a step Thursday evening,
when it was discussed at the
Board of Trade. A live committee
was appointed to take the matter in
hand and formulate plans and details.

This committee is composed of
Messrs. G. M. Debus, C. K. Hagedorn,
D. B. Detweiler, W. V. Uttley, H. J.
Sims, C. Kraus, G. O. Philip, W. J.
Moody, A. Feick, G. Shirk and W. H.
Schmalz. This committee will meet
again next Tuesday evening.

The members present Thursday evening
were Messrs. S. J. Williams,
R. Smyth, H. J. Sims, D. B. Detweiler,
C. Ahrens, C. K. Hagedorn, J. U.
Clemens, A. Feick, W. V. Uttley, G. M.
Debus, H. A. Dietrich, D. B. Mus-
elman, W. J. Moody, G. Shirk, M. Don-
ald, O. Master, L. D. Merrick, C.
Kraus, A. Weesehlo, F. Sheppard and
L. McBride.

The applications of Dr. S. B.
Biehn and E. D. Brand as members,
were accepted.

The Board of Trade at Toronto is
preparing a bulletin report of the
recent Conference of Boards of
Trade of Canada, which they offer to
other Boards at 50c per copy.

Mr. Smyth, as one of the delegates,
said the report would be most in-
teresting to all the members of the
local Board.

Mr. Hagedorn coincided and said it
was a mistake for delegates to at-
tend a conference like this one, if
they had not studied the questions
to be discussed.

Mr. Clemens thought the delegates
from the Berlin Board should have
brought back a report of the pro-
ceedings. Mr. Williams felt that the
Board should buy 100 copies.

The questions discussed were so im-
portant that the Board thought 75
copies should be disposed of and that
number will be ordered.

The question of better train ser-
vice was again discussed. Mr. Debus
has been in communication with the
Goderich Board of Trade and has
recommended that representatives
from every town on the route, from
Goderich to Brantford, should form a
committee to deal with the problem
of bettering its present service, for
Berlin.

Mr. Detweiler thought the most ef-
fective lever to be to boycott the
freight service when the C. P. R.
arrives.

It was pointed out that years ago
Berlin had a better train service out
of Toronto than it has now.

Messrs. Debus, Detweiler and Utt-
ley were appointed a committee to
deal with the problem of earlier and
better train service.

The question of holding a two days
demonstration, as proposed by Mr.
S. J. Williams some weeks ago, was
introduced by President Smyth. He
thought that the opening of the Sugar
Refinery, the C. P. R. connection;
bridge, electric road and the
Centennial of the County should be
fittingly celebrated and Berlin
advised that Mr. Williams concurred
that Berlin should be kept prom-
inently before the public; and cited
the City of Detroit, which is being
celebrated extensively and receiving
large amount of transient trade.

Mr. Williams advised all the members
to read the News Record's editorial
on that theme. He advised having the
demonstration under the auspices of
the Board of Trade, and enlist the
active sympathy of all the organi-
zations in town.

He wants Lusy Berlin to be kept
before the people of Canada and the
United States, and the only way to
do it, is to do it ourselves.

Mr. Debus would like to see it
take place and offered to give his
time to it. October 15th would be
just a shade late, and as the Sugar
Refinery contractors pledge them-
selves to have the factory in opera-
tion by Oct. 4th the celebration
might take place several weeks ear-
lier. Carloads of Americans will be
here to see their refinery and all Wat-
erloo County will want to go through
it. This being a County affair, the
County fathers should take some in-
terest in it.

Mr. Merrick suggested having the
County Fair held during the same
time, and also interesting the Trades
and Labor Unions.

Secretary Moody of the N. W. Agr.
Society said he believed that could be
arranged and would add greatly to
the success of the Fair. Mr. Moody
also said it would be a good idea to
have the Toronto and Montreal Base-
ball Leagues Baseball Clubs for a game.
The attractions should be such as to
give the best and biggest two days
Berlin has ever seen, and that will
attract thousands of persons to Ber-
lin. He would like to see it help the
scheme along.

Mr. Sheppard mooted an Old Boy
Reunion but it was thought there
was hardly sufficient time to attend to
all the details of an Old Boy Celeb-
ration.

Adamson G. Kraus said he is right
in line and then moved the appoint-
ment of the committee named above.

The question of a railroad into
Waterloo was brought up by Mr. De-
weiler but under existing circum-
stances, the Board considered noth-
ing definite could be done.
