Agricultural. Building an Ice-house. The simplest kind of a structure will keep ice. A cheap board building with cracks battened will answer the purpose. For a permanent house it is well to build a brick r stone foundation, and to bed the sills in mortar. The walls should be double, and can be made so by using two by eight inch lumber for studding. Line both sides with paper, and board up tight, but do not fill in. Let the roof project on all sides, or build under the shade of a tree, or on the north side of a larger structure. Always leave


