

#### Toronto Markets.

"CANADA FARMER" Office, Sept. 12th, 1867.

The weather has been remarkably fine, the harvest well gather ed, and threshing operations are vigorously pushed on to secure the early markets. Grain is now coming into the city in considerable quantities. Yesterday the receipts of barley from waggons would amount to over 10,000 bushels, and other grains are coming forward in the usual proportion at this season.

Wheat—Receipts by cars, 1,215 bushets, on the street but little offered. Present values of the different varieties are, full \$1.40 to \$1.50, spring \$1.50 to \$1.40, undge-proof \$1.55 to \$1.42.

Barley—The market opened at 65c to 75c, advanced to 70c to 75c, and closed at 65c to 75c, the receipts being large and increasing, a lot of 1,300 bushels, rather interior, soid at 70c f.o.b., and 350 bushels at the same price.

Oats - Market steady, 50c to 51c paid to day for street receipts

Pas.—Firm and higher; street prices opened at 65c to 70c and closed at 70c to 75c; the latter flaure is exceptional.

Ryc—A few loads sold at 76c.

Flour—Receipts 1,514 barrel—the market ruled quiet and rather dull, but closed firmer with only a small business doing. No. 1 superfluo may be quoted nominal at \$6.75 to \$6.90 at the close. There was a fair supply of fance in market, and sales were 300 bris at \$7.05 on cars at Weston, the market closing steady and firm. For extra and superior there is no demand, lots of extra were offered at \$7.25 and of superior at \$7.50, with a sale of 100 bris extra at \$7.25.
