The discussion which arose on this question was not contined to the subject, but mandered mildy all round it. One gentleman had a touching regret for the "domestic institution" of the Southern states; a lady recommended honger terms of serrice, and a lalies" combination to "fix the rates of mazees," and to detine $s$ domestie servana's daties ! A renerable clergyman considered that extravagatly high wages "had a tendeney to lower the morale." (Did he ever experience a "moral declension" fom this caten? One clergyman had very wearly

settled in the minds of the homely Anglo-Saxon race. What is to be the issuc of the contict between capital and lnbour, betwen employer and employb, between design and execution, between brain work and handieraft? It has to be fought out in Great Britain, where the yenst of dincontent is fermenting in every industrial occupation, paralysing for the time being the manafacturing interests of that great country. Tho solution is to be fonnd, so far as our past experience teaches ma the reduction of mamal al con be saved aren in houschold work, a true economy of time, tomper, and money will be realized.

The labour question will not be solved by immigrationcompetition is searcely possible in so large and elastio a conutry as this great Dominion-but habits may alter nad adapt themselves to the exigencies of a new order of society, which may be after all a condition not less happy or enjoyable than those of our forefathers-and this is what the situation indicutes. People whoenigrate to Canada, wieln, very naturally, to retain as much as possible the habita and customs and ramily arangements which they have been brought up to consider "comfortable." And as soon as they begin "to get
along" and make" comfortable incones," they make their homes more and more "Scotch," or "Irish," or "Engliath," respectively. And those who are "well-to-do" set the fashion he:e, as in other countries, w those immediately below them in the socisl seale.
Much has been done (though not enough) in Montreal to taect the requirments of the Eaglish amd sooth "midule chass" community. Temement bouses, where the kitchen is laid out for the conveaience and combort of the mistress of the house and the family, are a great social adrance upon the Parisian and scoteh systems of "flats" or "ehamires en wit and the American system of tharding-houses and hotels.
The question now to be solved in, not how can we iacrease the supply of this unantisfactory chas wilahour, which destroys all the comfort of home-lit; by the chaking of unwilling chains and the demand for an unearard wase-but how can we supersede it? On this we shall be prepared to oller a suggestions in our nexi isene.
