next senior retired Admiral, the Hon. Geo, Grey. But Sir Provo Wallis enjoys-besides that of his great age-the now almost unique distinction of survival of the wars of 1814-15. The venerable George Keppel, Earl of Albermarle, who, at the age of 15 was an ensign at Waterloo, died last month in his 92nd year. Men got commissions early in those days. Sir Provo Wallis is, however, further distinguished by his identification in no secondary degree with the memorable frigate action, which, after several reverses, due to inequality of force, re-established the prestige of British seamen. Captain Broke, as everyone knows, was disabled by severe wounds. The first lieutenant of the Shannon was accidentally shot, and it devolved on Wallis, who was second, to take into his native port the victorious Shannon and the conquered Chesapeake. To this day, according to old accounts, Halifax has never seen the like excitement. So far as we are aware, Sir Provo, who is specially retained at the head of the active list, still enjoys wonderful health for his advanced age. -- Halifax Critic.
