

next senior retired Admiral, the Hon. Geo. Grey. But Sir Provo Wallis enjoys—besides that of his great age—the now almost unique distinction of survival of the wars of 1814-15. The venerable George Keppel, Earl of Albemarle, who, at the age of 15 was an ensign at Waterloo, died last month in his 92nd year. Men got commissions early in those days. Sir Provo Wallis is, however, further distinguished by his identification in no secondary degree with the memorable frigate action, which, after several reverses, due to inequality of force, re-established the prestige of British seamen. Captain Broke, as everyone knows, was disabled by severe wounds. The first lieutenant of the *Shannon* was accidentally shot, and it devolved on Wallis, who was second, to take into his native port the victorious *Shannon* and the conquered *Chesapeake*. To this day, according to old accounts, Halifax has never seen the like excitement. So far as we are aware, Sir Provo, who is specially retained at the head of the active list, still enjoys wonderful health for his advanced age.—*Halifax Critic*.

If the tender be not accepted, the cheque will be returned, and if a contract be entered into for a part only of the Supplies tendered for, an accepted cheque for five per cent. of the amount of the contract may be substituted for that which accompanied the tender; the contract security cheque will be retained by the Department until the end of the fiscal year.

Each tender must, in addition to the signature of the tenderer, be signed by two sureties acceptable to the Department for the proper performance of the contract based on his tender.

The *Times* correspondent at Plymouth states that an examination has been concluded by professional "viewers" into the condition of the magazine rifles of the Dorset Regiment at Plymouth, and as the result 61 out of 750 rifles have been condemned and returned to Birmingham. No less than 361 mainsprings were found to be broken, and 216 of the magazine springs. This illustrates the extreme weakness of the springs, but it is alleged that the defects of the Dorset rifles are greatly due to exposure in wet weather at Bilston Camp. Some of the barrels were found to be bulged by the bullets.

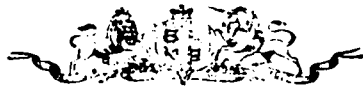
