After the service over one hundred of the congregation who wish to be received into the Church gave their names, requesting immediate instruction, and already a great many children are attending the Catholic schools of the parish. On Tuesday evening St. Mary's was filled at overflowing. Father Chase again occupied the pulpit, and the sermon was followed by Benediction of the Adorable Sacra-
