The five new agreements on nontariff measures reached during the Tokyo Round are: an agreement on interpretation and application of Articles VI, XVI and XXIII of the General Agreement on Tariffs and Trade (the Subsidies Code); an agreement on technical barriers to trade; an agreement on government procurement; an agreement on import licensing procedures; an agreement on customs valuation procedures. In addition, the Antidumping Code negotiated during the Kennedy Round was revised in the Tokyo Round Negotiations.
