GOVERNMENT ORDERS

CRIMINAL LAW AMENDMENT ACT, 1972

AMENDMENTS TO CRIMINAL CODE, CRIMINAL RECORDS ACT, NATIONAL DEFENCE ACT, PAROLE ACT AND VISITING FORCES ACT

Hon. Otto E. Lang (Minister of Justice) moved that Bill C-2, to amend the Criminal Code and to make related amendments to the Criminal Code 1967 Amendment Act, the Criminal Records Act, the National Defence Act, the Parole Act and the Visiting Forces Act, be read the second time and referred to the Standing Committee on Justice and Legal Affairs.

He said: Mr. Speaker, the bill before us is another step in the program of the government in continuing law reform. The origin of this program lies with the omnibus criminal law amendment bill which was introduced into this House on December 21, 1968, by the then minister of justice, the present Prime Minister (Mr. Trudeau). When this bill had passed into law it was regarded as a landmark by the legal profession in Canada and as a step in the developing process of law reform. Since that enactment we have seen continuing progress under my predecessor as minister of justice with the legislation of the bill on hate propaganda, the Bail Reform Act, Canada
