# UNEMPLOYMENT LEVELS—GOVERNMENT POLICY

Mr. Nelson A. Riis (Kamloops-Shuswap): Mr. Speaker, my question is also directed to the Minister of Finance. He indicated yesterday that his Budget would be a very fair one. He will also be aware that there are 500,000 young people unemployed during this International Year of Youth. There are also 600,000 women in Canada who are jobless today.
