NORTH ATLANTIC TREATY ORGANIZATION

CANADIAN PARTICIPATION IN MILITARY EXERCISE IN NORWAY

Mr. Bob Hicks (Scarborough East): Mr. Speaker, it was a pleasure for me to travel to northern Norway last week to observe Operation Brave Lion. Operation Brave Lion was an exercise of our Canadian Air and Sea Transportable Brigade held in northern Norway, which saw over 5,000 Canadian troops and over 2,000 pieces of equipment transported across the Atlantic to combine forces with the Norwegian army.

This exercise illustrated to all of our NATO allies our ability to assemble and deploy equipment within the time frames outlined in our bilateral agreement with Norway. But it illustrated something further, Mr. Speaker. It showed the world the outstanding calibre of Canadian troops in a seven-week exercise held in frosty sub-zero conditions. This exercise was the largest single movement of Canadian troops and supplies to Europe since the Second World War.

Members of this House and, in fact, all Canadians should be justly proud.

AIR TRANSPORT

HAMILTON AIRPORT—SUGGEST REALLOCATION OF LANDING RIGHTS

Ms. Sheila Copps (Hamilton East): Mr. Speaker, only a few weeks ago we heard the Minister of Transport (Mr. Crosbie) saying that the Lester B. Pearson International Terminal 1 is in crisis. Then, lo and behold, only three days ago the same Minister proudly announced that he has agreed to allow another airline to land in Toronto at Lester B. Pearson International Airport, this at a time when a \$50 million facility in the city of Hamilton is lying in waste with an average passenger load some days of only 40 to 100 people.

Will the Minister of Transport listen to the regional council, listen to the City of Hamilton, and designate TAP Air Portugal as an airline which comes to Hamilton? Will he make

sure that any further international carriers given landing rights in southwestern Ontario are asked to land in the heart of the Golden Horseshoe, in the city of Hamilton? Otherwise any talk about fiscal responsibility by the Government is simply a farce.

REGIONAL ECONOMIC EXPANSION

FUTURE OF HINTON, ALTA., PROJECT

Hon. André Ouellet (Papineau): Mr. Speaker, on Monday a decision will be taken in an American boardroom which could have serious repercussions on the future economic development of the town of Hinton, Alberta. On the line is the projected modernization and expansion of the Champion Forest Products mill. Also on the line are many, many important jobs. At issue here is the CNR's non-competitive freight rate and a \$350 million investment that will be lost if the Government does not act.

AIRPORTS

VANCOUVER INTERNATIONAL AIRPORT—PROPOSED ACQUISITION BY PROVINCE
