CABBAGE DISEASE CAN BE CHECKED

Club Root Will Yield Readily to Proper Sanitary

Measures.

Removal of Male Birds After Breeding Season is Necessary Course.

By practising proper sanitary measures, club root, one of the most serious of the diseases which attack cabbase, may be precented from obtaining a foothoid in the soil oldevoted to growing this crop. A parasitic organism called a slime mould is responsible for the diseased condition of the plant thru root hairs, or thru injured parts of the root. The prassite later transforms to a mass of spores, which escape into the soil with the decay of the root. The organism is is reported to be able to live in the soil of ra period of, at least seven years, and will attack susceptible plants at any time during that period.

The spraying should be done early into at the older plants will be indeed the plants are coming into bloom; if left until later a number of the older plants will withstand the action of the spray and will form seed. It is absolutely necessary to spray thoroly and with good pressure. In order to do so with a broadcast attachment, it will be necessary to keep the horses walk very slowly. If an attempt is made to cover the ground quickly, some of the plants will be missed, and the results will not be satisfactory.

In regard to the cost of spraying with iron sulphate it was found that the cost of the material per acre varied from \$1 to \$2.40. If the iron sulphate is bought wholesale, it can be purchased at \$1 per 100 weight, so that \$3.50 to \$2 per arce should cover the \$1.00000, July 11.—Canadian bacon.

In the last four years the number of cattle, sheep, lambs and hogs slaughtered for home consumption and export has been 10,700,000, and during the same period the flocks and herds of the same animals have increased 3,225,000. Poultry Pests-Mites

Now that the warm weather is here we find the usual increase of the peats of the poultry yard, mites. One of the best mixture to use in combatting mites is kerosene emulsion. It is made by mixing two gallons of kerosene oil, one half-pound of whale oil soap, one quart of home-made soft soap and one gallon of water. Dissolve the soap by boiling the water, then remove from the fire and add the kerosene at once. Churn the mixture rapidly and violently until it is as smooth as beaten cream. One part of the emulsion to several parts of water is used for application to buildwater is used for application to build-ings, dropping boards or nest boxes. Add one or two ounces of carbolic acid to the emulsion immediately be, fore spraying. This is a splendid dis-infectant and insecticide to use about the poultry house.

TAX ON CAPITAL MAKES IT FORSAKE GERMANY

IT FORSAKE GERMANY

Canadian Press Despatch.

BERLIN, July 12.—Notwithstanding the sharp punishments threatened against tax-dodgers by the war-tax laws passed by the reichstag last year, it is evident that much Gesman capital has fled the country to escape taxation. The matter has just come up for discussion in a committee of the Prussian House of Lords. It was claimed, and the government admitted it, that very large amounts of capital had gone to Switzerland. It was said that a big bank in the west had established in that country a trust company, with nearly \$4,000,000 capital, whose sole business is to take charge of German moneys. It was added that Swiss banks have flooded Germany with circulars offering to take deposits, and that already not less than 120 banks and other concerns have been established in Switzerland, either with German money or for the purpose of taking charge of German deposits. The government's representative finally informed the committee that amendments to the tax laws would be proposed in order to make it possible to tax more effectively German property held in foreign countries.
