

in some of the Northern *American Colonies*, and perhaps from some illicit Traders in the Southern Colonies; but if such a Prohibition shall be found expedient, and approv'd by the Legislature, the Prospect on all Sides would certainly be much more agreeable than it is now; for we now see some of his Majesty's Subjects in North *America*, put themselves under an uncertain and precarious Dependence on Foreigners in regard to this Trade, who may, and probably will, when they find it for their Advantage, sling off that Dependence in one Day: But on the other Hand, we shall see all his Majesty's Colonies in *America* dependant on each other, and every one working for the mutual Advantage and Improvement of the whole, under the Succour and Support of their Mother-Country; which will be a more certain and lasting Dependence, as it will hold as long as the *British* Empire shall stand.

(f.) To countervail any Disadvantage that may, for a short Time, attend some of his Majesty's Subjects in the Northern Provinces of *America*, proper Bounties, and other Encouragements, may be given for raising Hemp, Flax, Silk, Pot-Ash and Iron in those Provinces, Part of which may be sent Home rough and raw, in such Proportions as shall be found advantageous to their Mother-Country, in order to be manufactur'd in this Kingdom. Then these Commodities, which are now purchas'd chiefly with Cash, will be purchas'd with our home Manufactures, carry'd thither by *British* Navigation.
