TALT-BRASSEY MATCH PRODUCED HIGH SCORES

Good Day's Shooting at Long Branch - Private Clifford Received King - George's Letter at Luncheon.

LONG BRANCH, Aug. 17.—(Special.) Ideal weather conditions prevailed for the shooting of the Talt-Brassey competition in the O. R. A. meeting at the "High Range." Clear air, and a steady light breeze combined to make high scores possible, and the "bulls" were recorded. The match calls for seven rounds, at 300, 500 and 600 yards.

Sgt. G. S. Carr, 5th Canadian Field Artillery, won the match with a score of 101 at the three ranges. Pte. A. Taylor of the 7th Westworth Regiment, and Lt. O. Anderson of the 8th R.A. tied for second place with 98, Taylor being awarded the money. The Talt-Brassey Cup, valued at \$200, which is presented by Sir Peter Talt of London, Eng., for the battalion match connected with the competition, was won by the 10th Royal Grenadiers. Accompanying the cup is \$180 in cash. A company of the 7th Westworth Regiment, won the company team prize, valued at \$125, which is offered by Lord Brassey of England. The top scores are:

Private W. J. Clifford, 6th M., winner of the Prince of Wales Cup and the King's Prize at Bisley, tied with others at 98. Clifford's shooting was naturally a little off color as his shooting kit had not arrived, so he was without his own rifle. At the luncheon given by President M. B. Oker, 10th Rgt., among the officers of the militia, His Hon. Col. Gibson, Gen. Oker, C. McDonald, commanding the Toronto militia, Col. Hendersen, commanding the Hamilton brigade, Col. Hendersen, commanding the 10th infantry brigade, Col. Wallace, commanding the 10th brigade, and Col. Simson, Fotheringham, Chadwick, White, P. Mason, Grant, Bruce, Goddard, Henning, Helmer, Newton and several others.

During the luncheon Col. Gibson introduced Pte. Clifford, who had brought home the King's Prize. Col. Oker, who was not present a day older than he did a decade ago, proposed the toast of the host, Mr. Oker, to which the senior-president made a suitable reply.

CITY HALL BUDGET

Batch of News for Voters and Taxpayers.

Chief Thompson, of the fire department, waxed wroth at a criticism of his specifications for fire hose at yesterday's meeting of the board of control. Controller Spence was not satisfied with them. "If any living man can prepare them better, I will give up my job," declared the chief.

The contracts were awarded as follows: 2000 feet, Gutta Percha Company; 2000 feet, Dunlop Company; 1800 feet, Goodyear Company; and 1000 feet, to the Canadian Rubber Company. It was recommended to the council that Mayor Geary, Controller Church and Ald. McCausland be sent to represent the city at the annual convention of the Union of Canadian Municipalities, to be held at Quebec from Aug. 23 to Sept. 1. Controller Spence thought that to send money Controller Church and an alderman were enough, he thought.

Widening St. Clair-Avenue. It was recommended that the following portions of properties on St. Clair be bought for the purpose of widening the street: Richard Brown, 51 Wellington west, 100 feet frontage, 231 square feet, for \$128.94 in Bracondale. M. W. Galloway, 53 St. Alban's, 55 feet frontage, 947 square feet, near Wychwood-ave, for \$300.

Half dozen light engines for the use of the city in the construction of the civic car lines on St. Clair-ave and Gerrard-st., have arrived. Three that will be used on the St. Clair line are built in Pittsburgh. The cars which will be used with the engines will arrive from the States and will be commenced to arrive. A track is being built between the G. T. R. siding and Gerrard-st., on which the rail and the cars will run.

New School Items. Thirty-eight additional rooms will be ready for occupation when the city schools open after the holidays. Eight rooms will be ready at Oakwood High School, two of which will be used for public school classes. Four new rooms will be opened in Humberdale Collegiate.

In Earlscourt school four new rooms will take in classes from three rented rooms, two rooms in a portable building and from a temporary room in the basement.

A new kindergarten will be added to Howard school. A temporary room in the mission building will be opened for a class at Fisherman's Island.

Seven new rooms in Kimberley, eight in Rodney, four in Norway and two in St. Clair schools complete the number.

Mr. Schultz vs. Bylaw. If R. H. Schultz starts to build at Bloor and Spadina-avenue in the face of a bylaw, as it is said he has decided, the city will issue an injunction and have the courts decide the question. City Solicitor Johnston says that he is convinced that the bylaw is sound.

Building Permits. The number of building permits being issued at the present time assures the builders of busy days until the cold weather sets in and the inability there will be an unusual amount of brick and stone laid during the cool weather. It has been the custom to make application for permits early in the spring, but this year the requests are continuing to pour into the city architect's office and so far there is no sign of their ending.

Amongst the permits issued yesterday were: A three-story concrete factory at the corner of Borauren-avenue and the C.P.R. crossing for Louis Bros. The building will cost \$25,000. In connection with St. Michael's Hospital there is to be a \$6000 boiler room erected by the Sisters of St. Joseph.

An apartment house, costing \$15,000 and three stories high is to be erected at 85 College-st. by J. W. Ellis. The Consumers' Box Company were granted a permit to erect a brick warehouse on Ernest-avenue, at a cost of \$12,000.

LABOR DAY PARADE.

Greatest on Record in Toronto Being Prepared for Sept. 4. Labor Day parade this year will be larger than ever before. More than eighty-five per cent. of local organized labor will be represented, and the majority of these will be in uniform. Highly decorated floats, showing the different labor systems are being prepared, and great competition has been aroused among the locals as to which organization will have the best float. A handsome silver cup will be presented to the best union.

The annual baby show and athletic events will be held in the exhibition grounds. Fully \$500 in prizes has been donated for the games, and the September 4 is the great occasion.

Eaton are displayed in realistic beauty, some fine views of the Tecumseh-National lacrosse match at the island last Saturday, are shown in half-tone. A picture that will be of absorbing interest to at least five old gentlemen of Bronte, Ont., is that of a group view, including Master Andrew Leroy Clemence, the lad with the five granddaughters. Deer Park youngsters at a summer resort is an amusing picture that will please the juveniles. There are scores of other views equally interesting and depicting the busy summer. The ancient City of Babylon, which, according to biblical history was the most magnificent city of those times, and which contained the palace of King Nebuchadnezzar, is being uncovered and reconstructed by the Germans, in all its barbaric splendor, as an advertisement of German enterprise and mechanical skill. This work is aptly described in the picture in the four-color magazine section of this week's Sunday World. The illustrated editorial printed in sections entitled "Experiences that Kill," presents a realistic picture of modern conditions and suggests an immediate change in our methods that will tend to bring together those extremes.

Mix-Up on Mortgage.

Fraud to the extent of \$600 is charged against John Hollinger in connection with a mortgage deal. Henry Dickenson, who alleges that he advanced that amount to Hollinger, acting as a security, brought the case yesterday before Magistrate Denison. Dickenson states that the understanding was that he held first mortgage on the cattle, but he now believes this is not so. The case will go before a higher court.
