An Extensive Traveler.

Is Rapidly Growing

Interesting Comparison With Regard to the City's Progress

MONTREAL, Dec. 23.—Interesting comparisons are being made at the city hall with regard to the great growth of the city from the point of the augmented value of property. The increase for 1911 over 1910, nearly equaled the total valuation in Montreal thirty years ago. According to a statement just completed by Mr. P. Collins, the new assistant city treasurer, the increase in the value of property for the current year over 1910, amounts to \$61,839,232, while in 1880 the total value of Montreal's taxable real estate was but \$65,624,359.

The completed figures for 1911 are so

large as to be difficult to grasp readily. The gross assessed value is half a million dollars, and the net taxable value is \$881,180,848. 
