

TWO CHILDREN BURNED TO CRISP

Mother and Father Absent From Earls Court Home—Older Youngsters Tried to Light Coal Oil Stove.

Two children were burned to death at their home at 31 Bird-avenue, Earls Court, in a fire which broke out shortly before noon yesterday. They were Irene Dillon, two years of age, and Francis Dillon, nine months of age. The fire was caused by the explosion of a coal oil stove. The dead are the two youngest of six children of Mr. and Mrs. David Dillon, five of whom were in the house at the time. Kate, aged eight years, the oldest of those who escaped, says that the children were playing in the kitchen when the stove in the hall exploded. She, with Madge, aged six years, and John, aged five years, ran out into the yard, leaving the two younger and helpless children in the burning house. When the alarm spread, Mrs. Corduroy and Mrs. Taylor, near neighbors, endeavored to rescue the little ones, but were driven back by the flames. The firemen were a long time in coming, for the nearest hall, Ossington-avenue and Keele-street, are from a mile and a half to two miles distant. When the firemen arrived, part of the walls, the roof and floors had fallen. The water was immediately turned on and a few moments later several firemen forced their way into the smoking ruins. William Evertson of the Ossington-avenue Hall came upon the two tiny bodies floating in the water in the cellar. They were burned to a crisp. The father, who is a carpenter and who was at work at the St. Clair-avenue separate school, where the mother was relieving the caretaker, are prostrated with grief. The mother says that when she left the house there was no fire in the hall. All the little girl can say is that the stove exploded in the hall, so it appears that the children must have tried to light it and thus caused the fire. The house was a brick structure, which Dillon had built himself since coming from England six years ago. A police of \$1000 was carried. The fire was almost entirely confined to this house, altho the roof of the home of Mrs. Parsons, next door, caught fire, as did that of Mrs. William Baird, 29 Bird-avenue. The water pressure was very poor and this, as well as the long run, hampered the work of the firemen. Chief Thompson says that the pressure was very poor in the district, having been reduced there owing to the excessive use of water the last few days. He said, however, that had more pressure been needed it could have been had from the high level pumping station. He said that he considered his men had made a good run, considering the distance and the poor roads. It took them about 15 minutes to get to the fire.

CONTRACTORS MUST ANSWER COMPLAINTS

Regarding Union Wage Scale—School Caretakers Will Have to Get Up Earlier.

Contractors for the board of education will be notified to meet the property committee next Wednesday afternoon respecting complaints of not paying the union wages. That was one of the orders to the secretary at the meeting of the property committee yesterday afternoon. Wages until the end of July were voted the widow of Richard Edwards, the caretaker who was found dead at Cottenham-street school on Tuesday morning. Caretakers will have to get up an hour earlier to comply with a new regulation adopted, that the temperature must be up to 60 degrees by nine o'clock. Ten o'clock has not stood the test of the present cold snap. Dr. Noble said the health of the children was more important than the convenience of the caretakers. Supt. Bishop recommended the appointment of B. Kirk as sanitary plumbing inspector at \$1800. Some of the trustees wanted M. Miller, who placed his figure at \$1800. The two names with those of other applicants were referred to Chairman Hodgson.

ALARMING FIRE ON LINER.

GREENOCK, Scotland, Jan. 12.—(Can. Press.)—A most alarming fire experience was undergone by the passengers of the Allan line steamer Pretorian, which sailed from Philadelphia on Dec. 29 for Glasgow and reached here this morning. Flames broke out in the smoke-room on the upper deck yesterday morning when the liner was about 180 miles from Main Head. The fire assumed alarming proportions and there was considerable excitement, but the prompt work of the crew arrested the spread of the conflagration. The smoke-room, however, was entirely destroyed. No one was injured.

HALIFAX'S BIG FIRE.

HALIFAX, N. S., Jan. 12.—(Can. Press.)—The fire which to-day destroyed The Herald newspaper office was the greatest conflagration in years, destroying half a block of the business part of the city, and ruining Premier Borden's law library. The loss by the fire is estimated at \$500,000. The conflagration in The Recorder office was checked when it reached that building. The insurance will fairly cover the loss.

PAROLE SYSTEM WORKS WELL.

OTTAWA, Jan. 12.—The Dominion system of releasing prisoners on parole during good conduct is being shown by the passage of time to be a splendid success. Up to date (the system was inaugurated in 1900), a total of 2731 persons—a majority of them from the penitentiary—have been let out on parole. Only 291 of these have had their licenses canceled. Many of these, even were not for fresh offences, but for not complying with regulations. But 2539 settled down into honest life, so far as all evidence had gone.

MURDER TRIAL STIRS FRANCE.

PARIS, Jan. 12.—(Can. Press.)—A sensational murder trial in which several members of an aristocratic family are involved opened to-day at Caen and is being followed throughout France with absorbing interest. A youth, aged 18, is accused of brutally slaying his father, the Baron de Couvigny at the instigation of his mother and with the complicity of other members of the family.
