## LEAFS CONTINUE VICTORIOUS MARCH

Jim McCaffery on the Job for a  
Real Game at Skeeters  
ville.

### NOW TEN STRAIGHT

Dan's Men Play Rings Around  
the New Skeeter  
Outfit.

Jersey City, N.J., July 24.—Jim McCaffery, owner of the Toronto Maple Leafs, saw his pennant hopes hand the rejuvenated Skeeters another decisive trimming in today's line-up between Howley's boys and Driscoll's athletes, the advantage resting all with the Leafs, by a score of 7 to 1. Owner McCaffery is here to attend tomorrow's meeting of Farrell's league at the Hotel Belmont in New York, and the Toronto magnate breezed into the grounds here just as his employees sent their first run across the platter in the opening of the first inning. The Maple Leafs must have received notice of McCaffery's intended visit, for they excelled all past efforts in their exhibition today, simply playing rings around the Skeeters from beginning to end. They hit the ball hard and ran wild on the bases, and there was no holding them when they reached the get-away corner, no less than five plumed sacks being charged to the account of the runners-up.

Pete Was Good, and served up a puzzling assortment of twisters, that had the Skeeters guessing from start to finish, and as in the game of the previous day, Jersey City proved helpless before the visiting gunner's slants after the third period, when they broke thru for the only run hung up in the two days' fighting. Five blows were made by the home team in the first and third chapters, but after that only two additional hits were accumulated. They found his curves repeatedly and laced them all over the field, stinging him for ten safe drives, three of them being contributed by Eddie Onslow, his last blow covering three-quarters of the route. He landed the apple in deep right and gave Whitehouse a hard chase to prevent the Leafs' first sealer from completing the circuit. Bill Purcell also made good connection, and laced up two hits in the first run. Only one frame was needed to put the game on ice for the Leafs.

Away They Go. Relley, the first man up, drew on Waldbauer for a pass to first. Joe Wagner slipped in a sacrifice. Cellaan grounded to short and died at first. Then Lear came to the scratch with his sliding hit, which put Waldbauer on the hospital list and sent Relley breezing over the pan with the first run. ### Likely Geo. Stallings

#### Claims This Credit

Credit for one of the latest improvements of inside baseball is given to George Stallings, manager of the Boston Braves. Stallings noticed that when he sent a player to bat with instructions to sacrifice, the pitcher would pitch high and inside. If the batsman tried to bunt, a sacrifice was to be delivered, sought to checkmate the plan.

The opposing infield would draw in and inside. If the batsman tried to bunt, a pop fly often would result.

Why play right into the hands of the other side? Stallings said, "Let's try some way to get the better of them."

As a result, Stallings evolved a new plan.

If the opposing pitcher throws in a high one that obviously is a ball, the batsman is to let it go by. If the pitch is a strike the batter is to swing, thus standing a chance of driving the ball thru the drawn-in infield. Should he miss, the opposition is puzzled. It may think the hit was in, but the batsman has sacrificed, and the pitcher is forced to pitch high and inside.
