YANKEES GET A CONTRACT

Members of Canadian Manufacturers' Association Attend Works Meeting to Press Other Claims.

Hamilton, March 24.-(Special.)-The board of works had one of the liveliest meetings on record this evening. They met specially to decide whether the Cayuga Lake Company, Ithaca, N.Y., which quoted a price of \$1.55 1-2 a barrel, or the Grey and Bruce Company, Owen Sound, which quoted \$1.58, was to get the cement contract of some 15,000 barrels. A number of the influential members of the Canadian Manufacturers' Association attended to plead for the Canadian firm. The difference between the two companies on the whole contract will not amount to quite \$400. The manufacturers argued that the disabilities under which the Canadian firms labored more than offset the duty of 43 cents a barrel, and they said the Americans had quoted a dumping price, and that everything would be done to get the government to put the dumping clause in operation. In the end the board, by a vote of 4 to 3, decided in favor of the American firm.
