FOREIGN EXCHANGE QUALITY GENERALLY POOR

Good Demand for Butchers—Feeders and Stockers Wanted-Little Change in Quotations.

Morday was a comparatively quiet day on the Union Stock Market, but following Mor day was a comparatively quiet day on the Union Stock Market, but following after the heavy receipts of last week the fact was not a regrettable one. Two causes operated to render yesterday's trade a difficult one to handle. One of these was the unfavorable weather, and the other and chief one the unfinished nature of the stock offered for sale. Altogether 46 cars were on the market, consisting of 962 cattle, 12 calves and 3 horses. The run was not a heavy one, being slightly more than one half of that received one year ago on Nov. 7, when the receipts were 88 cars, composed of 1850 cattle, 68 sheep, 1 hog and 7 calves. But more than any other cause which operated to depress the market of the testing of the cause of the stock of the half of that received one year ago on Nov.
