

### GERMANY WON'T QUARREL

Over the Recent Incident in Regard to Samoa.

New York, Jan. 24.—A Berlin special to the Herald says: The reports published from the American press relative to the Samoan question have been received with amazement. It may be stated on the highest authority that the recall of Herr Rafael has not been demanded by the other two parties to the condominium, for the reason that his recall was communicated to them before the troubles broke out, and his successor already appointed. This is Dr. Solf, who held a position as judge at Dar-es-Salaam, the principal port in German West Africa.

HERR RAFAEL IN THE WRONG. Germany disapproves of the recent conduct of Herr Rafael, deeming his action contrary to the provisions of the treaty of Berlin, but she cannot recall him, as he has already been recalled, and the German Government has

not been requested to disavow him. Germany does not consider there is any need to call a diplomatic meeting to decide so small a matter as differences between three functionaries. If Britain and America wish to amend the treaty of 1889, Germany will gladly agree to a diplomatic conference, but there has been no communication on the subject. The German Government has not the slightest doubt as to the conclusion of an amicable arrangement without difficulty.

THE KAISER DEEPLY INTEREST-ED. Kaiser Wilhelm saw Sir Frank Cav-

endish Lascelles, the British ambassa-dor, and Herr Von Buelow, secretary of state for foreign affairs, twice on

Friday, when the news of the rupture between the consuls at Samoa arrived. Once in the morning his majesty call-ed upon them in the Wilhelmstrasse, and in the evenines he met them at the Radziwill banquet.

The British ambasseador is the cho-

sen friend of the kaiser, and Herr Von Buelow is the kaiser's own selection. When Bismarck was alive he ruled the foreign office; today, the kaiser takes such keen interest in foreign affairs that nothing is done without him. Samoa was the question on Friday.

NO TROUBLE ANTICIPATED. It was understood when the kaiser left the British embassy that he was convinced that Samoa was not a question about which there could be very serious trouble. His majesty, with the complete approval of his minister of foreign affairs, came to the conclusion, first, that the condominium, which had undertaken to arrange the good management of Samoa, had neglected its trust; that the representatives of America, Germany and England should have foreseen the death of the king, and the questions which would arise in that eventuality as to the choice of a successor, that they had lacked this foresight, and that the consuls had lost their heads when troubles developed, resulting in the undignified proceedings of which the cable brought the news.
