SWOOP CLOSE TO FOE

Trains and Attacks Seven Others.

With the British Army in France July 11 .- Superiority in the air, cleancut and unquestionable, rests with the British flying men. There have been

period exists now. Eritish airmen are supreme.

Not only have rallways, airdromes and other vital objectives been effectually bombed, but the loss of life among German troops in concentration camps has been exceedingly heavy. Captured documents bear testimony to this and prisoners admit it.

Flying Low.

The British have consistently conducted their raids from an exceedingly low height, sometimes coming down

low height, sometimes coming down to within fifty feet of the ground to loose bombs. The Germans, on the other hand, seldom venture below 10,000 feet, because of their fear of the Brit-ish anti-aircraft defences, which have reached a saite of perfection never be-fore achieved. The difference in the accuracy of the two services in bomb dropping thus has an obvious explana-

tion.

The straight shooting of British bombers is exemplified by the work of one pilot, who attacked two German trains near Hermies the other day. He obtained a direct hit on the first train. obtained a direct hit on the first train, and then blew up the track in front of it. Diving on another train nearby he knocked the trucks off the track with explosives. Having stalled these trains, he proceeded to rake them viciously with his machine gun. Incidentally he opened fire with his machine gun on seven other trains shortly afterwards with coed results.

There have been few infantry battles of late on the British front.

Thrilling Encounters.

On July 1 a British pilot, while on offensive patrol about Estaires, was pounced upon by three German scouts. As they swept down toward him, two of them collided. The third opened fire on him, but fled when the Briton manoeuvred into position and offered battle. In the meantime one of the other enemy planes had had both its wings torn off in collision and crashed. The other was going down in slow spirals. The British pilot followed and fired rounds into the Boche machine at close range. The enemy dropped another 3,000 feet smoking, and then burst into flames which finished it.

"Another fatal collision occurred the other day. A British lieutenant with a patrol of six machines was flying over German territory when he saw six
