Blackburn Watts, the Detroit horse owned by K. F. Adams and driven by Mallory, was favorite in the 2:16 trot and finally won the race after Abu Taleb had taken the first two heats.

In the 2:15 pace, Cherry, the favorite, won the first heat, but after that could not stay in front of Horace McKerron, who took the heat three, although closely pushed all the way.
