

WOMAN CRUSHED TO DEATH WHEN STRUCK BY AUTO

Mrs. Leo Sullivan Victim of Accident Saturday Afternoon.

WOMAN AT THE WHEEL

Hundreds Viewed Remains Before Identification Made On Sunday Morning.

Jammed between an auto and a post at Dundas and Clarence streets, at 3:45 o'clock Saturday afternoon, Mrs. Leo Sullivan, 267 Waterloo street, was crushed so badly that she died almost instantly. She was 23 years of age. As a result of the accident, Mrs. Henry Drayson of Wardsville, who was driving the car, is in a precarious condition from nervous shock at the home of her father, John Gale of the Asylum side road.

Fred Merton, 409 Dundas street, was the first to rush to the victim's assistance. He raised her in his arms, but she died a few seconds later. Dr. Kenneth MacLean and J. N. Childs were called. Death was due to concussion of the brain, her skull being crushed severely.

The body was removed to George Logan's undertaking rooms. Dr. A. McLaren was summoned and decided to hold an inquest.

Identified Sunday. Although hundreds of people viewed the remains identity was not established until late Sunday morning, when Thomas A. Terry, a neighbor, identified her by the clothes she was wearing.

Eyewitnesses of the fatality say that the auto came from the east, turned south on Clarence street and narrowly escaped striking a woman. This, it was said, unnerved Mrs. Drayson with the result that the car hit Mrs. Sullivan, who had just stepped from the curb, knocking her eight feet. Before the car could be brought to a standstill it had run over the curb, and crushed the woman against the pole.

Driver of Car Dazed. After the accident Mrs. Drayson, who was accompanied by her niece, stepped from the car and walked around the corner in a dazed manner. A stander-by took her into a store, where Dr. MacLean attended her, and had her removed to her father's home.

The car was taken to the police station, and held as evidence in the coroner's investigation.

At the inquest at the undertaking rooms at 8 o'clock on Saturday evening, Dr. McLaren declared that a post-mortem examination would be made.

Inquest Thursday. Detective Thomas Nickle called the following men to act on the jury: George H. Stinson, 80 Oxford street west; A. Brown, 548 Elizabeth street; Albert Donohue, Oxford Park; Jack Armstrong, 235 Talbot street; James Garratt, 267 Simcoe street; Edward Taylor, 773 Queen street; C. A. Pratt, 288 Bidout street; F. S. Neely, 66 Palmer avenue, and James Totten, 14 Brighton street. They chose George Stinson their foreman, and after discharging their preliminary duty adjourned to meet at 8 o'clock on Thursday evening at the police station, when the inquest proper will be conducted.

Was to Visit Mother. Mrs. Sullivan left home at 2 o'clock in the afternoon to do some shopping after which she intended going to see her parents, Mr. and Mrs. John Taylor, 23 Talbot street, St. Thomas. When she did not come home at night her husband was a worried man.

Mr. and Mrs. Sullivan were natives of St. Thomas, where they went to school together. A few years ago they came to reside here. One child, a son, who will be one year old on the 23rd of this month, survives.

The remains will be taken to St. Thomas at 5:30 o'clock this afternoon, where the funeral will take place, from the residence of her parents Tuesday morning to Holy Angels' Church, where requiem high mass will be sung at 9 o'clock.

ROAD LEGISLATION FULLY DISCUSSED BY COUNTY COUNCIL

Hamilton Road May Be Designated As a Provincial Highway.

Road legislation, county roads and the discussion of the designation of roads occupied a great deal of the lengthy session of the county council on Saturday morning at the county buildings.

Many resolutions were passed, and opinions expressed regarding the improvement of the county road system. David Smith, seconded by W. E. Gieves, moved that the Ontario Government be asked to designate the Hamilton road from the city limits to the limits of Oxford County as a provincial county road. The motion carried. It was said that some years ago this had been asked, but the Government had deferred action saying that some other action might be taken. Today, it was said, it was realized that this was in connection with the provincial highway, but now that a route other than this had been chosen for the road it was thought that the request would be granted.

Statute Labor Act Useless. The council was of the opinion that the statute labor act had outlived its usefulness. It should be struck from the statutes of the province. A motion to this effect, made by James Peters and seconded by David Smith, carried. Some of the councillors were of the opinion that it should be left to the various townships, whether or not the act should be in force in their municipalities.

A motion of James Peters, seconded by J. G. Stewart, to the effect that the chairman of the board of directors and the warden be a committee to instruct the county engineer as to the calling of meetings of the board regarding the management of county roads, was passed.

A motion to ask Oxford County to have designated as a county road the portion of the Hamilton road under its jurisdiction in order that it might connect with the Middlesex portion. The motion carried.

Bylaws Carried. Bylaws providing for the raising by loan of \$20,000 to meet current loans and expenses and of \$60,000 to meet the cost of highway improvement work were passed.

A juvenile court, to be established in London for the use of the county and city, was favored by the council. A motion to this effect, made by James Peters and seconded by Alton Brockman, carried.

A report of the finance committee, recommending that in the recommendation to the 1920 council that it make a grant to the L. O. D. E. of \$12,000 to aid in the building of a children's hospital, that the amount be struck out, was adopted.

SOCIAL, ECONOMIC SALVATION THROUGH GREAT LABOR PARTY

Bishop Fallon Declared in Sermon Delivered Last Night.

NO NEED FOR CLASS WAR

Large Congregation Hears Bishop Discuss "Capital and Labor" Conditions.

"I look for the salvation of the world from modern political and economic conditions through the great labor party," said Bishop Fallon in his concluding remarks last night at St. Peter's Cathedral.

The bishop's sermon was the second of a series of four special Advent sermons in which he is dealing with the great modern day need for rest. As last Sunday, the occasion of his first sermon, the sermon, Bishop Fallon prefaced his sermon with the words "Come unto me all ye that labor and are heavy laden." Matt. xi, 28.

Using labor conditions in England as the basis for his discourse, after a brief resume of his first sermon, in which he had laid down the false principles which have led to the condition of unrest, viz., the supremacy of man; the sufficiency of this life as the goal of temporal greatness, he reviewed the growth of class distinction in that country.

The false principles named, he declared, "lay at the foot of the Protestant Reformation, which was nothing but a social and economic revolution, cleverly disguised under the cloak of religion by self-seeking, narrow-minded and utterly unredemptive villains."

No Longer "Merry England." "I do not claim that things were perfect before the Protestant Reformation," said his lordship, "they have not been perfect since Adam's disastrous fall, but they were never so bad as in the last 300 years."

Prior to 300 years ago the speaker said that England was justly known as "Merry England," and that the conditions which gave rise to this name were the ownership of the land by the people either outright or under long and interrupted leases under the church. Leases under which the tenant could not be evicted nor the rent raised.

The seeds of ruin were laid by Henry VIII, when he ordered the confiscation of the property of the Catholic Church, said the bishop. If as Henry VIII had intended the lands had come into the possession of the crown it might have been for the better, but unfortunately he was unable to withhold the demands of the oligarchy which had already begun to take form for payment for their service in gifts of property of the crown.

His son, Edward VI., and to still greater excess during the reign of the Duke of Somerset, of whom every member of parliament demanded his price and got it.

Common Lands Seized. His lordship reviewed the seizure of the common lands under the same reign. These common lands he likened to a reserve of grain in the barn or a balance in the bank on which the public had the right to draw. Taking the statistics from the Encyclopedia Britannica, in which he stated appeared the greatest indictment of the English oligarchy, Bishop Fallon pointed out that in 100 years the common people of England were robbed of 4,770,000 acres of common land.

Speaking of the "Crafts" and "Guilds" which existed during the middle ages, his lordship showed how they had been obliged to give up their privileges in exchange for a protection against monopolies till their wealth attracted the greed of the oligarchy. Bishop Fallon pointed out that in the modern trade unions the speaker saw the ghost of these old guilds.

He dealt briefly with the change wrought by the advent of machinery and the wonderful development of the nineteenth century and the evils which resulted therefrom. The gradual encroachment of the wealth of the country in the hands of a few and the conditions of practical slavery under which the people lived were also outlined.

That all efforts toward amelioration of these conditions had hitherto proved unsuccessful he declared was due to the fact that the oligarchy which had proved too strong for Henry VIII, is still too strongly entrenched. He pointed out that conditions in the United States in these matters were precisely the same as in England.

In closing he declared that he "looked for the salvation of the world from present social and economic conditions through the great Labor party if it takes the reins of constitutional government into its hands. They certainly cannot do worse. They must not, however, listen to the siren song of the calls of socialism. Socialism is stagnation; it is industrial slavery; it is cruel and illegal. There is no need of, nor call for, a class war."

"In this great struggle for freedom and democracy the Labor party will find the great Catholic Church solidly behind it."

MINISTER PRAISES PRESS OF LONDON FOR SPLENDID WORK

London Papers Convey Word of God, Says Rev. G. A. Leichter.

"The power of the press in London is wonderful. Take off your hats to the daily papers of this city. The editorials that have been printed within the last few weeks have accomplished the work of a dozen preachers. Next to the preacher, the Bible comes the press as the medium for conveying the Word of God."

The foregoing was spoken by Rev. G. A. Leichter to his congregation at Adelaide Street Baptist Church on Sunday evening in reference to the editorials on religious subjects.

A Vision in the Daytime was the subject taken by Mr. Leichter, in which he discussed the Apostle Paul, the most colossal figure in the New Testament. Such a lot of folk blame sin onto the weakness of the flesh, a torpid liver or something of the sort. Should the heavenly vision reveal our innermost soul to us, we would soon convince ourselves differently. Richard Baxter and Edward Payson, both men who hardly knew a wall day in their life, passed their last hour on earth doing something for the Lord. Richard Baxter left a number of volumes which have become immortal to Christians, and Edward Payson spent his last days preaching the gospel.

All on Same Level. "We cater too much to the cravings of our sinful nature. When we dissolve partnership with this old body of ours, where will our souls go? When the day comes that millionaire and pauper stand on the same level, when all men become one equal, what shall we say? There will be few of us that will be able to say 'I was not disobedient unto the heavenly vision.'"

So many of us have a nature that is hell to deal with. We are surrounded by a gulf of iniquity on all sides, but we must all remember that we can cross the gulf of safety into the arms of Jesus, by implicit faith and doing the works of the Lord. And we must be able to say, 'I was not disobedient unto the heavenly vision.'"

WESTERN ONTARIO AVIATORS ORGANIZE TO PROMOTE FLYING

New Club Will Erect Aerodrome and Encourage Flying For Sporting Purposes.

The Western Ontario section of the Canadian Flying Club was organized Saturday afternoon at a largely attended meeting held in the Tecumseh House. Nearly thirty local fliers were present and the meeting was a most enthusiastic one. It was decided to become affiliated with the Canadian Flying Club, the Aero Club of Canada, and the Royal Aero Club of the United Kingdom.

The officers of the new organization were elected as follows: Honorary President—Major H. A. Stevenson, M. P. P. First Honorary Vice-President—Col. H. Abbott.

Second Honorary Vice-President—Capt. Walter Smith. Third Honorary Vice-President—Brig.-Gen. H. Panet, C.B., C.M.G., D. S.O. Fourth Honorary Vice-President—Major Hume Cronyn, M. P.

Secretary—J. B. Selak. Treasurer—Clayton Slater. It was decided to leave the election of the directors, who will also act as governors until a later date.

The committee of selection will be appointed at a later date also. The aims of the Flying Club are as follows: 1. To look after the social requirements of Canadian aviators.

2. To promote aviation in Canada in a sporting way. 3. To provide facilities to enable members to learn to fly, and to increase the proficiency of members who have already learned to fly.

4. To be prepared to act as an air force reserve should the need arise. One of the first actions of the club will be to assist in the establishment of an aerodrome in this city. Already plans are under way and it is expected that other local organizations will co-operate in accomplishing this.

The local club will be represented on the executive committee of the Aero Club. It is also expected that the Dominion Government will subsidize all flying clubs in the Dominion.

Success is Assured. The large attendance at Saturday's meeting and the enthusiasm for the future success of the organization. There are nearly 100 local fliers, but many were unable to attend the meeting because of engagements. The next meeting of the club will be held in the evening, when a special feature will be the presentation of a certificate to the members.

In addition to its aviation activities, the club will be devoted to the social development of its members, and it promises to be one of the best and biggest young men's organizations in the city. Its membership is not limited to fliers only, but is open to anyone interested in the work it purposes.

HEAVY LOSS WHEN FREE PRESS GARAGE BURNED

Nine Automobiles Destroyed and Chauffeur Narrowly Escapes Injury.

Nine automobiles were burned and Bert Darch narrowly escaped being severely burned when the Free Press Printing and Publishing Co.'s garage, situated on Wellington street, between Chesapeake and Victoria streets, was completely gutted by fire at 4:30 o'clock on Saturday afternoon.

One of the employees of the place was cranking a car when it back-fired, causing the fire. By the time Mr. Darch had got out of the building he had lost his overcoat, watch and \$20 in cash. A Mr. Wright, who is employed there, also lost an overcoat. Henry Mutt, advertising manager of the Free Press, owned one of the cars. Another had just been delivered to a garage by a salesman at 10 o'clock on Saturday morning. Included in the cars lost were a sedan and two delivery trucks.

So intense was the heat that a fence fifteen feet distant was scorched. The loss is covered by insurance.

CAPT. J. J. L. ARDIE, POPULAR OFFICER, GOES TO OSHAWA

Capt. J. J. L. Ardrie, after four years' service in the army, resigned last week and left for Oshawa, where he takes a position with the General Motors Corporation.

Capt. Ardrie, who before the war was well known in this city, was manager of the Dominion Bank's east end branch. On the formation of the 16th Overseas Battalion in 1915 he received the appointment of paymaster of that unit, and proceeded overseas with it.

He was the first officer of the battalion to reach France, where he served as paymaster and adjutant of the Second Pioneer until that unit's absorption in the Fifth Engineers Battalion.

He was the leading officer of the battalion's first advance party to the Rhine, and was recalled after a few weeks' stay with the Canadian units holding the Rhine bridgeheads for duty in Canada.

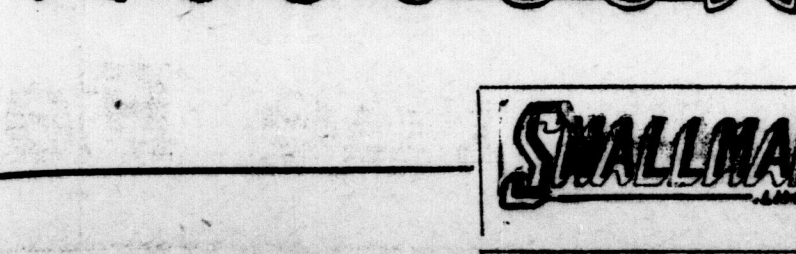
