The following are a few facts taken from the annual report:

The Bible Society since its foundation 116 years ago has published and distributed more than three hundred million copies of the Scriptures and is now sending out an average of nearly ten million volumes a year, translated into over 520 different languages, Testaments or Gospels being published in a new language on an average every seven weeks of every year. In these languages 300 did not even possess an alphabet until the friends and workers of the society reduced them to written form and translated the Scriptures into them, the aim of the society being to give to every man in his own tongue the Scriptures of God without note or comment. For Canada alone the society furnishes the Scriptures in no less than 110 languages, and is now circulating more than 300,000 copies annually in our Dominion. Copies of Scripture in a Diglot version—the English and his own language in parallel columns—is placed in the hands of every foreign immigrant coming into Canada. This is a contribution of incalculable value toward creating among these people the spirit of Canadian Christian etizenship, and teaching them the English language.

The Bible Society rejoices in the sympathy and generous support of every body of Christian people. Its work is fundamentally necessary to the carrying on of the missionary work of all branches of the church. It furnishes Bibles, Testaments and portions of Scriptures in more than 120 languages to all Christian and missionary organizations, practically without cost, no matter in what part of the world their work may be. An adequate return to the Bible Society for what it freely contributes in this way to the carrying on of missionary work in every corner of the earth would be at least one-tenth of what every Christian body raises for missions. From the Bible Society the Baptist Churches in all parts of the world are drawing supplies of translations in 64 languages, the Anglican Church in 190, the Presbyterian in 135, the Methodist in 99, the Congregational in 59, and smaller bodies in 35. The society employs more than 1,000 colporteurs as pioneering agents to sell cheap copies of the Gospels in the remoter corners of the earth. These editions are sold at prices which the poorest people in any country can afford to pay.

The commission leaves for Woodstock to day, where next week they will hold a rural conference.

The laymen at the last meeting held on Friday evening discussed the suburban work, and were of the opinion that more than one society should be interested in this work, and the people in the suburbs be made to take hold of the religious work themselves to a great extent. They realized, too, the great need in the churches of today for more equipment to meet the requirements of the young people and leaders in the churches who could develop the fourfold life among the Methodist young people.
