OPPOSE BUILDING CHURCH IN TORONTO

Alderman Considers it Peculiar Action in the Good Queen City.

"I do not see why an application to erect a place of worship in the city of Toronto, the good, should not be entertained," remarked Ald. Burgess at the meeting of the civic property committee yesterday afternoon.

These remarks were prompted following a petition from M. Stone and others against the establishment of a house of worship by the congregation of Chevre Exras Israel at 28 Cecil street.

Ald. Plewman understood that the property had been bought for the purpose of a church.

Property Commissioner Chisholm recommended, and it was agreed to install street lights on Hanson street, Colin avenue and Imperial street.

Mr. Agar said there was some misapprehension in the matter. It was not intended to use the place as a public garage, but only as a sales-room for automobiles and trucks.

MAYOR IMPRESSED WITH DETROIT VISIT

Regards St. Lawrence Development as One of Greatest Canadian Schemes.

"I was very much impressed by the gigantic organization in the western states for the development of the St. Lawrence river and the building of the St. Lawrence canal," said Mayor Church yesterday, on his return from the waterways convention at Detroit.

The Ontario estate of the deceased Henry Wade Walpole Vade of Scarborough, Eng. is inventoried at \$18,500. Two parcels of land in his estate, which is valued at \$38,172.

WILLS AND BEQUESTS

Under the will of the deceased Mrs. Ellen M. Shapley, wife of H. W. Shapley, barrister, \$1000 is to be divided between her friends—Mrs. T. P. Webster and Mrs. M. Kenny—and the residue of her estate is to be held in trust for the maintenance and education of her six-year-old son, James Merritt Shapley, until he is 23 years of age, when he inherits absolutely. Deceased left \$28,415.

Value of Basic Industry. Mayor Church emphasized that Toronto had much to learn from Detroit, and among the things he mentioned were:

1. The value of a basic industry in the development of a city. Toronto would in a few years see the value of such a plant as Baldwin, Limited.

2. Recognition of water-borne traffic in the development of the industrial life of a city.

3. The importance of the development of a system of Hydro radials such as that radiating from Detroit.

4. The benefit to the people of a system of good roads.

Mayor Church was also much impressed that Detroit, which has an island—Belle Isle—similar to Toronto Island, makes a far different and better use of it. There are no houses on Belle Isle, it being given over entirely to park purposes for the benefit of all the people. A bridge is now being built to the island to take the place of boats. This, said the mayor, should also be done in Toronto.

Aldermen's Eyes Opened. "We had our eyes opened," was the expression some of the aldermen used while talking concerning their journey to Detroit, first as delegates to the convention and second as visitors to Detroit to gain ideas of civic administration in other cities.

Parks, transportation facilities and the boulevards in Detroit impressed the aldermen most, and they learned so much that pilgrimages to other cities of the United States will probably be undertaken in the future.

LENNOX BLAMES CITY FOR LEAKAGE IN ROOF

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MAKING REDUCTIONS IN ASSESSMENTS

Returned Soldier With Two Sets of Twins Granted Concession on Appeal.

E. T. H. Smith, a returned soldier, of 11 Brampton place, who can boast of two sets of twins and one other child, had his assessment reduced in the reunion court yesterday to last year's figure, \$500.

The Dominion Glass Company appealed against an assessment of \$40,275 on land on Lisgar street, and obtained a reduction of \$15 a foot. It was pointed out that one parcel had been purchased a few years ago from the city for \$15,000, and that the assessment at \$75 a foot would bring it to approximately \$28,000.

Land belonging to the Canadian Rumely Company, on Lisgar street, was reduced from \$70 to \$55 a foot. The property is 537 x 107 feet, with a total assessment of \$37,890.

On another parcel of 5.78 acres, they were granted a reduction of \$1000 an acre, from \$16,000 to \$15,000 an acre. Eric Van Horne, 194 Dovercourt road, and Lenora Bicknell, 128 Dovercourt road, were both successful in obtaining a reduction from \$52 to \$47 a foot on account of their proximity to the Ideal Bakery, which, it was stated, caused considerable annoyance owing to the noise of operations.
