IN GERMAN FACTORIES.

Work commences in Germany at 6 6.30 or 7 o'clock in the morning, and usually stops at the corresponding hour in the evening. The workman has a quarter of an hour for breakfast, from an hour to an hour and a half at noon for dinner and a quarter of an hour in the afternoon for tea. Sometimes and in some factories the breakfast period is not authorized. The average length of the day's work is ten hours. In the textile industry it may be a quarter of an hour longer. The care of women and children has concerned the state far more than the hours of the male workers. Night work for women is prohibited, nor can they remain in the shops after 5.30 on Saturday afternoon or on the eve of a holiday. The law fixes the maximum of the woman's working at eleven hours, except on Saturday and the day preceding holidays, when it is ten hours. A midday rest of one hour is compulsory, and women with household cares may claim an extra half hour.
