Champion Pony Purchased for \$5,000. The secretary of the American Hackney Horse Society has received notice from the English Hackney Horse Society that the champion pony stallion Fire Boy has just been sold for export to the United States. The new owner of this noted little sire is Miss Anne Vancian, of Philadelphia, who is prominent in the business and financial world.

It is said that \$5,000 was paid for the stallion. He has taken rank in the last few years as the leading hackney pony sire of Britain, his offspring having won more prizes than that of the famous Sir Horace at the last two London hackney shows. Fire Boy and his colts won over all comers three years in succession at the shows of 1910, 1911 and 1912.
