In the three greatest factors of war—financial resources, man power and munitions—the Allies are now superior in two and equal in the third, that of munitions, and would soon be superior in all. That was the conclusion that Sie George Foster reached in his address before an overflowing audience at the Imperial Theatre last night and he added: "I am not prodigal in words or rash in statement but I say, as I say to ever y Canadian audience that I address, that at this very hour the British Empire is in deadly, peril. You may not think so but it is absolutely so. It is in peril of its liberty, its civilization, its power of free dovernment, in peril of its national and imperial existence. With the enemy that we have against us tireless and relentless, nothing but the completest sacrifice and effort of the whole empire and its Allies will be sufficient to gain the victory, for a victory in a contest of this kind which is not complete and real is a defeat for the nations engaged and for the world at large."

Roosevelt Actually Began Raising Corps and Believed He d Soon Be in Francers

London, Nov. 19—Sidney Brooks, in a cable to the Daily Mail from New York, tells of an interview with Theo-

York, tells of an interview with Theodore Roosevelt, whom he says he has never known to be so vehement on any subject as he is on the United States' in action in the present war.

This matter of fact, he says, "the former president feels so acutely the figure his country has cut in the war that he doubts whether he could ever again endure a visit to Europe. When the Lusitania was sunk and American intervention seemed inevitable, it is a fairly open secret that the former president made instant preparations for raising a force of about 12,000 men on the lines of his old rough riders regiment. The generals, colonels, majors, and some of the captains were actually selected, and for his adjutant-general Col. Roosevelt picked a man long known to me as one of the ablest officers in the United States cavalry.

"Every detail had been covered and the former president calculated that within three months after the declaration of war he and his men would be in Flanders. To forego that dream has been one of the bitterest disappointments of his life."

Meanwhile, the situation in Serbia grows more serious. The Austro-German armies, with the Bulgarians on their left, are pushing southward driving the Serbian forces before them, while in the south the Bulgarians, reinforced by men and guns, from Von Gallwitz's army, are pressing on towards Monastir, from which town they are said to be only a few hours' march.

There is some uncertainty as to the Serbians', line of retreat. Some despatches say they are falling back on Monastir, where there are British reinforcements; others that they are retreating on Ochrida, on the southern Albania frontier.

The big guns are continuing their lively bombardment in the west, while in the east there has been no change.


