CYCLONE CAUSES DESTRUCTION IN SASKATCHEWAN

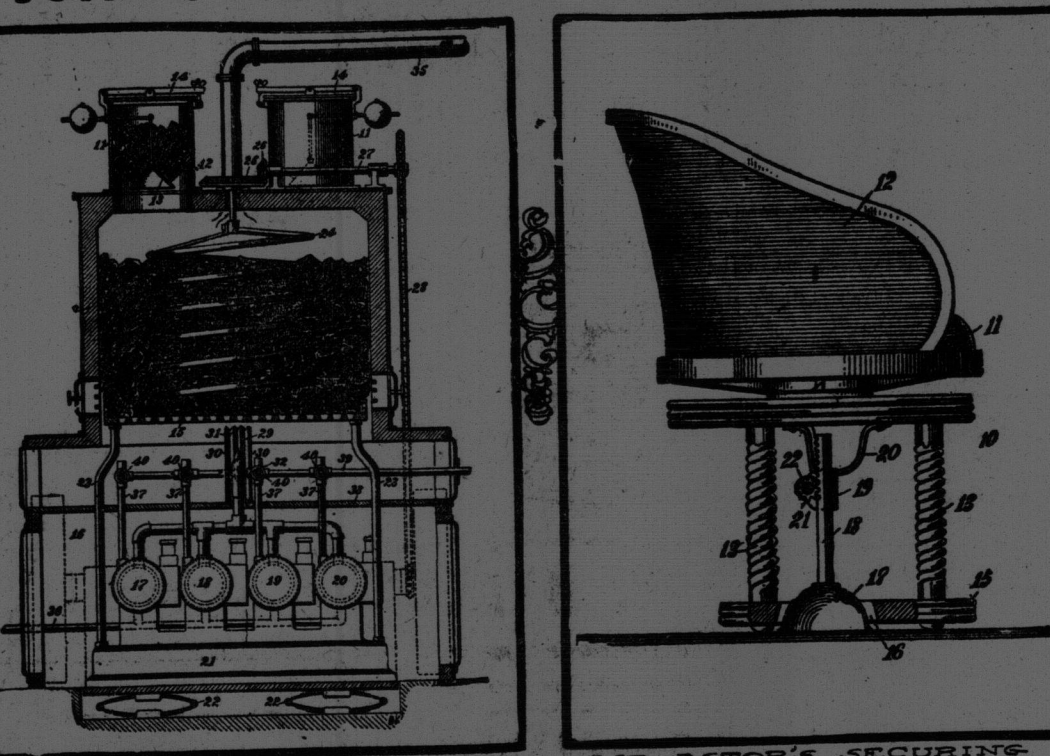
Moore Jaw, June 28—An appalling story of death and destruction as the result of a cyclone which reached the city over the telephone from Township 24, 10 miles south from Moore Jaw, in sections occupied wholly by United States settlers. The cyclone struck the neighborhood about 2 o'clock in the afternoon, immediately followed by a terrific hailstorm, which swept a strip of country a mile wide.
Every house in the path was destroyed. Three persons were killed, several more or less seriously injured and all the crops destroyed.
The dead—Ed, Meddian and his two children.
The injured—His mother, two sisters and two brothers; a hired man, named Wilson, who suffered a broken leg; Palmer, collar-bone broken, and two others, Thomas and Ward, cut and bruised about the face.
As soon as the message was received medical help was rushed to the scene.

CANADIAN NEWS
Conferences of Railway Heads and Men to Continue—Big Timber Deal in Nova Scotia—Death of D. W. Hoegg

Montreal, June 28—This was a day of conference between the representatives of the trainmen and conductors' unions and the vice-presidents of the Canadian Pacific and Grand Trunk. Apparently nothing was gained save the fact that on all sides the principle of further conference was recognized, which gave hope that such discussion might lead to an eventual settlement without open hostilities.
Halifax, June 28—It is understood that the Eastern Canada Lumber Company's payment to the Royal Bank of Canada for that bank's claim on the Alfred Dickie timber limits and mills is \$250,000.
Mr. Dickie has a balance of about \$100,000 and his lumber areas in Labrador are still in his hands. The Eastern Canada Lumber Company has an option on the property in Labrador.
This company with the 460,000 acres of timber limits in Nova Scotia that it has now purchased has about one-fourth of the good timber limits of this province. The next largest company is the Davison concern at Bridgewater with 200,000 acres and the Miller company at Ingonishport with 100,000.
It was the purchase of the Dickie area that made possible the undertaking of the railway scheme which provided for the building of 200 miles easterly from Halifax, and on which a total provincial and federal government subsidies amounting to \$12,800,000 will be paid.
Portland, Me., June 28—(Special)—Daniel W. Hoegg, founder of the well known shoe goods firm of Maine and New Brunswick, died at Portland today, aged 83. He was the pioneer of the industry in Canada.
At the last meeting of Division No. 1, A. O. H., the following delegates were chosen to represent the division at the convention which will be held in Sydney beginning August 24: F. L. Barrett, J. J. MacIntyre, W. H. Coates, J. G. Donovan and W. H. O'Neill. C. Ferguson, J. Gallagher, J. McAndrews, J. E. Bain and J. MacIntyre were chosen as alternates. The division here are contemplating a monster excursion to Sydney at the time of the convention. This matter will be definitely settled at the next meeting of the society.

JOHN JACOB ASTOR AS AN INVENTOR



Washington, D. C., June 28—While his friends in New York have shown much interest in the announcement that John Jacob Astor has entered the ranks of the inventors in producing a movable chair that can be secured to the floor at will by its occupants, the invention primarily having in mind the comfort of passengers on steamships, the public apparently has heard nothing of a more important invention by Mr. Astor that has to do with the production of gas from peat.
In the specifications filed by Mr. Astor with the Patent Office his invention is described as "A Vibratory Disintegrator for Gas Producers." It consists of a gas producer, including means for supporting from the peat so adjusted as to transmit its gas to the peat, and a vibratory disintegrator operated by the engine and serving to raise and lower the pressure of gas within the peat.
While Mr. Astor describes his apparatus minutely with drawings and specifications, he makes it plain that it is upon a principle rather than upon a machine that he lays claim to patent rights, and he describes a number of variations as to number of engines, etc., that may best be adaptable to varying conditions. It is provided that the residue can be reduced to either coke or material for fertilizer.
On his patent claim Mr. Astor merely has made a practical application of the vacuum, a rubber disc at the base being operated by a spiral and gear so arranged beneath the seat as ready to be operated by the occupant.

The Evening Chit-Chat

I HEAR that shirring is coming back into style," I said.
I thought that a most inoffensive remark, and was accordingly quite surprised when the dress-making lady who was squatting on the floor hanging my skirt with the aid of a mouthful of pins, nearly swallowed them in her effort to say something.
"Never!" she ejaculated, as soon as she had managed to extract sufficient of them to make speech safe and possible. "Never, I hope, Miss Cameron. Of all the things that you can do to a dress shirring is the worst. There is nothing attractive about it. If the material is pretty, shirring makes it more so. The only possible use of shirring is to show that you could afford to have some poor dressmaker put a lot of work into your gown."
Did I quail before this tirade that I had aroused? No, indeed; I was delighted. I realized the value of having gotten the dressmaker lady nicely started on a subject on which she is such an authority, and did my best to spur her on to tell some of the other inartistic and foolish mistakes women make in gowning themselves.
And here are some of the pearls of dressmaker wisdom that she let fall.
"Never let a yoke line slant up in the slightest degree. That is absolutely fatal. The line should be straight or bow slightly downwards."
"In making the new overcoat dress, if you have a coat of the same, be sure either that the skirt covers the overcoat or that it is cut well above it, and that the skirt follows the line of the skirt."
"Many of the shirt waists, even from the most expensive maker, do not have the shoulder seam far enough back on the shoulder. This is a very bad fault, as it makes the back much less straight."
"Dutch necks are absolutely impossible. I don't care if everybody on the face of the globe wears them. They are not good style. They look as if you had either gotten your collar or were trying to crawl out of your dress head first. You should either have a distinctly low neck or high collar. Half breeds aren't accepted in good society."
"Never make a princess dress without making the sleeves large and full. For some reason that accounts for the fine slender lines of the princess effect."
"Touches of black velvet on a light dress are extremely inartistic."
"A belt of a separate color spoils a figure. A belt of the same color as the waist is poor taste, and of course, makes you short waisted. If you want to look trim and have the best figure possible to you, always have the belt the same goods as the waist, and if possible, stitch it on."
And, as I am coming up, as I were, a threshold of all the pearls of wisdom onto a single string, I give the dressmaking lady's final comment:
"The Paris makers from the best houses, my dear, never elaborate or fuss. They are made on severe lines and trimmed simply with some good embroidery. The whole thing is to have pretty goods and have it made on good lines."
Myself, I don't claim to know a tremendous lot about gowns, but, having seen her products, I'm sure the dressmaking lady does, so I humbly beg to offer you her suggestions.

Daily Hints for the Cook

SPICED MACKEREL.
One cup of salt, one cup sugar, one tablespoon butter, one cup vinegar, one cup oil and rub in salt and sugar. Pack in earthen pot, cover with vinegar and bake four or five hours. Cut head and serve at once.
MARSHMALLOW FROSTING.
Take one 10-cent can of marshmallows, place in double boiler until they get soft and begin to spread. Take one white egg, beat until stiff, add enough confectioner's sugar to make stiff, then add few drops of vanilla. Add the melted marshmallows and beat well. It will only take a few tablespoons of sugar as the marshmallows are sweet. Spread.
TOMATOES AND TOAST.
One quart can tomatoes, 1 medium size onion, 1/2 cup grated cheese, 1 dessert spoon sugar, butter size of a large walnut, 1/2 cup flour, thickening, salt and pepper to taste. Put tomatoes into a kettle, allow to simmer for 15 minutes, then grate the tomatoes and mix with the other ingredients. Bake in a hot oven for 15 minutes.
