### MORNING NEWS

### OVER THE WIRES

Willard Dow, who was arrested here a short time ago charged with theft from the mails, was taken to Moncton in connection with thefts from the mails there. He has turned King's evidence with the result that William Palmer, Harold Jamieson and Lawson Stuart, all recently employed in the Moncton post office have been arrested.

At the annual meeting of the Agricultural Society held in St. Stephen yesterday afternoon the reports of officials were received. A number of changes were made in the board of directors. L. B. Mitchell, the president, was re-elected. Thomas Fougere, a resident of Shediac Island, Westmorland county, was drowned on Wednesday while attempting to reach the mainland in a row boat. His boat became caught in the heavy slush and he was unable to extricate himself. People on shore, noticing his plight, were powerless to rescue him. He stayed in his boat for about six hours and then attempted to reach shore by walking on boards which he fastened to his feet. When but a few yards from his boat he sank. He leaves a wife and ten children who live on Shediac Island.

Lord Beaverbrook has donated a piano to Harkins' Academy, Newcastle, for use in the new assembly rooms. The instrument is similar to the one given by him to the Grammar school at Chatham.

In New York yesterday following a requiem high mass in memory of 'Lorraine' Macdonney attack was made on the Union Club in Fifth Avenue. The cause of the disturbance was a British flag which was hanging over the facade of the club. A cordon of 200 police finally surrounded the building but not until after all the plate glass windows on the ground floor had been smashed. Several persons were injured by flying brick-bats. The rector of St. Patrick's Cathedral in his ministerial robes pleaded in vain with the leaders to quell the disturbance.

The bodies of the British officers assassinated on Sunday were taken to England by destroyer yesterday. An impressive cortege proceeded solemnly to the quay. The way was lined with people mostly women and children and no untoward incident marred the occasion. By request of the British government all shops and public buildings remained closed from 10 a.m. until 1 p.m. The Black and Tans are reported to have raided a restaurant which remained open.

### CALL FOR PLANS

For New Municipal Building Soon.

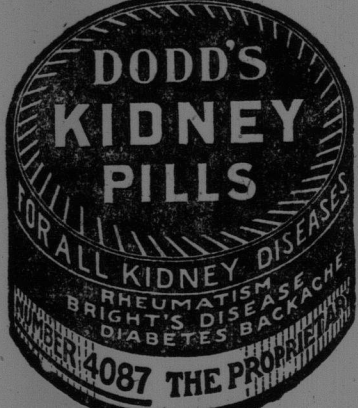
The quarterly meeting of the buildings committee of the municipal council was held yesterday afternoon with the chairman, John Thornton, in the chair and Warden Bullock and councillors Schofield Jones, Frink, Golding, O'Brien and Donovan, present. Matters in connection with the ruins of the court house were discussed and a sketch plan of a proposed building to occupy the present site was presented by C. S. Archibald and submitted to the meeting. The proposed building called for the court house and city offices in the same building. The sum of \$400 was ordered paid to Mr. Archibald for his work. Permission to erect a new building on the present site or on some site to be selected will be sought at the next sitting of the legislature and the sum of \$5,000 will be offered for competitive plans, after the legal position of the municipality has been inquired into regarding the offer of such a large reward.

### FARALINE HOME

TO BE OPENED 'EARLY NEXT YEAR'

At a meeting of the board of directors of the Faraline Home for the Aged held yesterday afternoon at the King's Daughters, Chipman Hill with Miss Ellen Thorne of Fredericton, the president, in the chair, it was announced that the home which is situated in Fredericton will be opened as early in the new year as possible. Fredericton members of the board were entertained at luncheon at the Kings Daughters. Afternoon tea was served at the Guild. Automobiles were placed at the disposal of the visiting members by Mrs. T. H. Estabrooks and Mrs. F. E. Williams. At the business meeting Mrs. C. A. McVey reported for the house committee. She explained that the committee would furnish the reception rooms, the offices and the rooms for the staff, but the inmates would provide their own furniture. The resignation of Lady Ashburnham as treasurer was regretfully received. Mrs. A. E. Conard tendered her resignation from the board because of ill-health, and Mrs. L. A. McAlpine was appointed in her place. Mrs. E. B. Nixon, Mrs. John Bullock and Mrs. L. A. McAlpine were appointed to the house committee.

Roy M. Wolvin, president of the British Empire Steel Corporation yesterday gave emphatic denial to a report that the Corporation had fallen through or was to be modified.
