MANUFACTURERS IN
ANNUAL SESSION

The annual meeting of the maritime
branch of the Canadian Manufacturers'
Association opened in Moncton yester-
day, W. S. Fisher presiding. Addresses
were given by Mayor Toombs of Moncton;
F. J. G. Knowlton, chairman of the
N. B. Workmen's Compensation Com-
mission; F. W. Armstrong, of the Nova
Scotia Compensation Commission, and
E. B. Saunders, field secretary of the
National Safety Council, Chicago.

In the afternoon the delegates
visited the shipyard of the Nova Scotia
Shipbuilding Company, Ltd., at the
mouth of the St. John river. The ship-
yard is one of the largest in the
maritime provinces, and is the only
one in the world where the hulls of
ships are built of steel.

Resolutions were adopted recom-
mending the removal of restrictions on
the loading of local Canadian-owned cars for
United States points; the granting of
federal subsidies for education in the
western provinces in lieu of the land
grants given the western provinces; the
development of hydro-electric power,
maritime union and the extension of vo-
cational training.

In order to aid the government of
New Brunswick in putting into effect the
vocational training act adopted at the
last session of the legislature, committees
were appointed to study the situation.
The committee for St. John is composed of
L. W. Simms and W. K. Ganong.

On the evening of the 29th, the
delegates were entertained at a banquet
at the Hotel St. John. The banquet was
given by the St. John chapter of the
Knights of the St. John.

The delegates will leave for their
respective homes tomorrow morning.
The annual session of the Maritime
Manufacturers' Association will close
tomorrow.

During the session, the delegates
were informed that the government of
New Brunswick had agreed to contribute
\$100,000 towards the cost of the
vocational training act.

The delegates also learned that the
government of Nova Scotia had agreed
to contribute \$50,000 towards the cost
of the vocational training act.

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
