KINGS COUNTY COUNCIL

Business of Closing Session of The Annual Meeting

The Kings County Council concluded its business yesterday afternoon. The committee appointed to interview the registrar of deeds with regard to securing for use of the assessors a full statement of transfers of property within the year, reported that the registrar will supply by March 1, a full list of all transfers of real estate for the previous six months, to the assessors of each parish at a cost of \$30 for the county, and for a statement covering a year, at the same cost, and books to record same, payable at the summer session of the council, which on their recommendation was approved. Coun. Gilliland brought up the presentation of the grand jury relating to the heating of the court house, and suggested changing the system of steam heating in the goal to hot water, as a question of economy. Questions were raised as to the frequent changes made during the past few years, and after the building committee and Mr. Barr, engineer and machinist, had been heard, the whole matter was allowed to drop.

John L. Coleman asked to withdraw his petition and papers re Dr. Wetmore, said, on motion, the secretary-treasurer was instructed to remove the same from the records, and return the papers to John L. Coleman.

On motion, the secretary-treasurer was instructed to furnish the parish clerk of each parish a copy of the consolidated assessment under Chapter 157 of the Provincial Statutes relating to fences, trespasses, and pounds.

It was resolved that Wm. L. Belyea be appointed the collector of all notes for the purchase of Grand Junction road, and be required to enter into bonds to the amount of \$800, with two securities, such bonds to be approved of by the council, and which, and that he receive a ten per cent of such notes, and three per cent for cash payments.

The assessment on the parish of Westfield for a road near Public Landing was again discussed, and finally ordered on a standing vote of 13 to 11.

It was ordered that \$4,000 be assessed on the county for contingent fund for 1913.

J. M. McIntyre, secretary of commissioners of municipal home, read his annual report, showing:

Total number of parishes \$3,711.84
Total value of property and other \$4,987.19
Total value of property and other \$15,789.02

Large amounts of amounts to be assessed on the respective parishes for pauper inmates.

It was resolved, that as there was some dissatisfaction in the minds of councillors with the management of the municipal home, the committee be authorized to place in the hands of the warden and secretary-treasurer for a thorough audit.

Coun. Sharpe and McIntyre were appointed a committee to investigate the question at issue between the parishes of Hammond and Sussex, regarding Charles Brown, a pauper inmate or inmate, and report at the next meeting of council.

The committee appointed to consolidate the by-laws reported that they had gone into the matter but found that more than consolidation or revision was necessary, and that many of the officers return to their regular duties, or to their ships.

The committee be authorized to place in the hands of the warden and secretary-treasurer for a thorough audit.

This was adopted and Coun. Sharpe and Allan Price were added to the committee.

On a vote of 14 to 12 it was decided to hold no meeting of the council in June, 1913.
