FIRE LOSS \$2,250

The insurance adjustment in connection with the Taylor & White fire in the north end has been completed and amounts to \$2,250, divided as follows: Building, \$1,100; stock \$300; machinery \$250. The insurance was held by the following companies: Connecticut-Vroom and Arnold, \$1,200; on the building, \$1,000 on the machinery, \$700 on the stock; Manitoba-Machum and Foster, \$1,000 on the building; Northern-Peter Church, \$1,000 on the machinery.

ELDER DEMPSTER SERVICES

J. H. Scumme & Co. announce that the Elder Dempster Canada-South Africa service will be started on December 29, with the Kwana, which will sail from St. John for Cape Town on that date.

The Cuba-Mexico service, also by the Elder Dempster Co., will be started on the 29th, the steamer Borm sailing from Halifax on that date for Nassau, Cuba, and Mexican ports.

C. P. R. PASSENGER OFFICE

The increasing staff of W. B. Howard district passenger agent of the C. P. R. has necessitated some changes in the King street office with a view to giving more room. The coming of the winter staff each year has tended to make matters still more cramped, so that it became essential to make better use of the space at their disposal. Accordingly the counter has been shifted across one end of the room running parallel with the door. This gives more room and makes an improvement in the appearance of the office. There is also considerable more counter room.

THE LATE DR. DRAPER

Arrangements were completed this morning for the burial of Dr. J. A. Draper, who died last evening. A telegram was received from a sister in Natick, Mass., asking that the body be forwarded there for interment. Services will be held at his late residence, 114 Mecklenburg street, at 3:30 o'clock, on Wednesday afternoon. There will be no funeral. After the service the body will be taken to the undertaking rooms of T. Fred Powers and placed in a metallic casket and from there will be taken to the Boston train, and sent to Natick.

ALLAN LINER COMES DIRECT

Pomeranian Makes No Halifax Call—Was in Bay This Morning

The Allan liner Pomeranian, from London and Havre, passed Bear Island at 9 o'clock this morning bound for this port, and is expected to dock between 3 and 4 o'clock. She has about eighty passengers.

This is the first trip of this line direct to this port, as formerly the steamers have called at Halifax. Last season it was decided to make the Halifax call one way only, on the run this way, the outward call being discontinued. It may be noted that the Halifax call is to be dropped altogether, though Manager R. B. Teale said today that he did not know if this would be done.

BALTIC BIG COMPETITOR

Cutting into Canada's Spruce Market in Great Britain

MR. TATHAM HERE

Representative of Greatest Firm of Lumber Brokers in the World Speaks of Conditions Affecting Lumber Situation

A visitor in St. John during the last few days was T. L. C. Tatham of London, England, representative of the firm of Churchill & Sim of London and Liverpool, the largest timber brokers in the world. His visit was of much interest to local lumber operators and shipping men and, although he did not come on business, advantage has been taken of his presence in the city to discuss matters relative to the lumber trade between Canada and the motherland.

To a reporter who had a pleasant interview with Mr. Tatham yesterday he spoke of the condition of the lumber trade in England especially as it applies to Canada. "The general position of the home spruce market," he said, "is that, prices having risen due to expenses in manufacturing and other such causes, more money is being put by English capitalists into the spruce forest of Russia and consequently a larger product is being sent from Baltic ports to the British market. Year by year the amount is increasing and this naturally comes in competition with Canadian spruce."

Asked if this was seriously affecting Canadian spruce shipments to the motherland, Mr. Tatham said that at times it was affecting them seriously, but not every year. "From the Baltic to the British market," he said, "was a matter of only four or five days and the freight was lower than that to be paid on shipments from Canada, but there were factors that tended to even up matters somewhat. On the whole, however, the Baltic was becoming a strong competitor with Canada in the British spruce market. The great danger to the Canadian trade, as he saw it, was that the price obtained by Baltic shippers in the British market was an excellent buying price for the Russian shippers and led to a tendency to send in heavy stocks which might overstock the British market to the detriment of the Canadian business. As an instance, he said, there were more than 200 lumber shippers at one Baltic port alone.

Speaking of the birch trade, Mr. Tatham said that competition had been developing in that also. It was found in a cheap mahogany which was being sent in from Africa.

The firm of Churchill & Sim has been in existence since the early part of the nineteenth century and is known in all countries as the largest firm of timber brokers in the world. They are selling agents for many of the St. John shippers. Mr. Tatham, who had spent in St. John on his way to New Orleans, left for the south last evening.

BRIDGE APPOINTMENT CAUSES PRETTY FUSS AMONG CONSERVATIVES

Defection from Party a Result—Candidates' Friends Speak Their Minds Over The Matter

There is insurrection in the Tory camp over the appointment of a new caretaker of the Suspension Bridge. Samuel A. Shann, having been given the position, as announced already in the Times. A strong applicant for the position was George Burns, a Conservative, son of the former caretaker whose tragic death while on duty caused such deep sympathy for his family. Had Mr. Burns been appointed, his friends say, it would mean that his mother, now eighty years old, would not have to leave the home that has been home so long and seek elsewhere a place to spend her remaining days.

Again John Britney and his friends are reported to be sorely disappointed over the way things have gone. Mr. Britney has been with the Conservative ranks for years and he and his backers feel that he has been ill used when opportunity came to reward hard and faithful work. It is openly stated today that Mr. Britney and others who were strong for his claims will be no longer allied with the Conservative party and that Lancaster will not be the only place where this will be felt.

MATTER OF ENTRANCES TO BARS IN HOTELS

Rev. Mr. Robinson Says He Will Place The Matter Before Moral and Social Reform Council

In connection with the charges made in the police court yesterday afternoon by Rev. W. B. Robinson during the trial of the Hotel Edward, for having more than one entrance to his licensed bar, the Rev. Mr. Robinson said this morning that he was going to lay the matter before the Moral and Social Reform Council with the idea of asking the attorney-general to investigate the actions of the liquor license inspector. He declined to say anything more about the matter at the present time. Inspector Jones declined to discuss the matter.

A fine of \$50 was imposed yesterday afternoon on Jas. D. Driscoll, and out of this comes a contention that liquor license inspector J. B. Jones, discriminated against Mr. Driscoll. J. A. Sinclair, who said he accompanied Mr. Jones on a visit to the Edward, said that other hotel bars were similarly fitted out with two entrances.

Daniel Mullin, K.C., counsel for the defendant, understood the action of the inspector, and said that Mr. Sinclair had admitted that Mr. Driscoll was not the only one not conforming with the law. His Honor found Driscoll guilty, but agreed with Mr. Sinclair in that it was shown that other violations had not been reported.


