PYTHIANS HEAR RINGING WORDS FROM PULPIT

Addressed by Rev. James
Dunlop at Annual
Church Service

SEES WORLD RISING
TO BRIGHTER LIFE

Present Time Great One of
Opportunity—Exhorts
Hearers to Duty.

In his ringing challenge to the members of the Pythian order at their annual service yesterday afternoon, Rev. James Dunlop declared that it was not enough for them to be faithful members of their order but that they must also take the obligation to carry forward Christ's Kingdom in these Maritime Provinces and to be worthy followers of the splendid pioneers who labored here for Christ.

The annual service was held in Centenary church, which was thronged in auditorium and gallery by the vast congregation that attended the service and the Knights of Pythias with the Pythian Sisters who were seated in the main body of the church numbered about 600. The music was greatly impressive with Miss A. G. Hea, organist of the church, directing and the choir taking part. "The Trumpet Shall Sound" was sung as a solo by William Lanyon and the choir rendered the anthem "For All the Saints," Mrs. L. M. Curran being the anthem soloist.

Assisted at Service.

Mr. Dunlop was assisted in conducting the service by Rev. Dr. David Hutchinson and Rev. R. G. Fulton, pastor of the church. The offertory, as is customary at the Pythians' annual service, is to go to the New Brunswick Protestant Orphanage and it will be a few days before the total amount given is known, as a number of contributions are still to come in.

The text of Mr. Dunlop's sermon was Rev. 21:5. "And He that sat upon the throne said, 'Behold I make all things new.'" Mr. Dunlop congratulated the Pythians on the labors of love they had accomplished and hoped that the coming year would be replete with consecrated work for Christ and the community and blessed with success.

Years of Opportunity.

Glancing back over the years that had past, Mr. Dunlop declared that the world was emerging from an age of doubt and criticism. To doubt, he said, required no intellectual effort and what the world needed was men with convictions.

Best of All Ages.

As years of opportunity, Mr. Dunlop declared, the present years were the best of all the ages and he spoke of the changes in China and India in this connection. But the greatest hope lay in the fact that Christ was alive and every movement that worked for Christ must succeed. It was Christ who had won the war and today He was making new men for God's greatest gift to the Church was manhood. He was making men to be the leaders in this new world of opportunity and the leaders were the thinkers for always the men who were thinkers would govern the men that were workers until the workers began to think for themselves.

Mr. Dunlop closed with his exhortation to the members of the order to carry forward the Kingdom of Christ. The Pythians present represented the Lodges New Brunswick, No. 1; Union, No. 2; St. John, No. 30; Carleton Tower, No. 37, and the Sisters represented Loyalist Temple, No. 18 and Moulton Temple, No. 14.

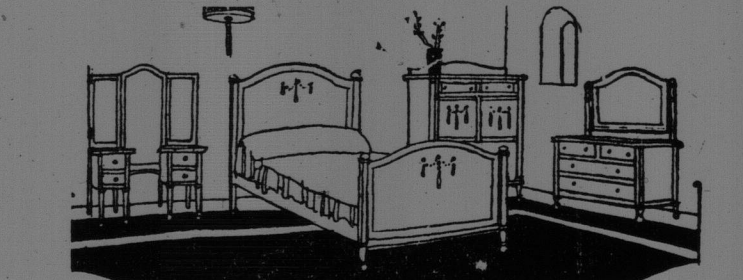
